OREGON STRAWBERRIES.

A correspondent of the Fruit Trade Journal of New York City, recently wrote as follows of Oregon's strawberries and apples at the Pan-American Exposition:

"Far away Oregon is not to be outdone in having strawberries on exhibition and a card with the following inscription is noticed: 'All the way from Oregon, 3,500 miles without ice.' So, even should our local berry crop be a failure in the future, our millionaires will have Oregon berries to fall back on. It is not to be wondered at that many visitors cannot overcome the desire to purloin a sample of the beautiful apples shown by Oregon, and the management of the booth have placed this placard, 'Yield not to temptation.' The Oregon commissioner should have been present years ago and handed this card to Adam."

PRUNES IN CALIFORNIA.

The San Francisco Chronicle says: "The prune crop will be very light, indeed, which, in view of the large carry-over stock, is fortunate. All prune growers were hoping for a small crop, and they will get it. Of sixty-two growers in all parts of the state reporting on prunes, six report a failure, thirty-nine a poor crop, fourteen medium, three full, and one 'heavy.' In the great prune-producing districts four growers in Tulare and Kings counties report three medium crops and one failure, while the reports from Santa Clara, Solano, Sonoma and Napa counties are invariably poor, some trees having a small crop and others none worth harvesting. The crop seems a little better in the upper San Joaquin valley than elsewhere, except in a far mountain district."

THE END OF EXCLUSION.

[Marshall Hall, Rep.] It becomes more and more apparent that there will be a strong and probably successful effort to defeat the re-enactment of the Chinese exclusion at the next congress. The act, which was passed in 1882, was for 20 years only and will expire next year. This coast is just beginning to awaken to the fact that no new measures will be enacted for the exclusion of the Chinese or any other Asiatics. The prospects of an unrestricted influx of Chinese cheap labor is not a cheering one for the working men of this coast, but they will probably have to put up with it. The East has never really believed in exclusion, and it was only enacted to keep the Pacific coast states from slipping their political moorings. Now we are after Asiatic trade and the open door, and we cannot

very well ask commercial favors of a nation whose subjects we exclude from our shores.

Perhaps the laboring men who will be displaced by the coolies may be able to go over to the Philippines and get a job; otherwise they may be unable to see where our new policies have resulted very much to their advantage.

An observant Portland woman who has been visiting the Pan-American Exposition says the Oregon exhibit is nothing to be very proud of, but that it is far superior to the Washington exhibit, although Washington appropriated twice as much money as Oregon did. It is also remarked that the mineral exhibit is the best of any, and attracts the most attention.

Notice—Sale for Tax Certificates.

Whereas, an act of the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon, (H. B. No. 11) approved February 23, 1901, requires that all lands upon which this and all counties in the state hold certificates for taxes, issued more than two years ago, shall be sold at public auction; and

Whereas, there exists doubts in the minds of some, as to the validity of sales made under this act:

It is therefore ordered, that in case of the failure of title to any tract or tracts of land so sold by the Sheriff of Lane county during the present year, A. D. 1901, and to which the title conveyed or attempted to be conveyed by the Sheriff's deed therefor shall be set aside and annulled by any court of competent jurisdiction, or whenever satisfactory evidence shall be produced to this court that such Sheriff's deed is for any reason invalid and insufficient to pass the title to the lands therein described, there shall be refunded to the purchaser or his assigns the full amount of the purchase price paid therefor, without interest, less any sum received by such claimant from the redemptioner, and a warrant issued therefor.
