COPPER TRUST BEATEN.

F. August Heinze of New York, has won his long fight against Miles Finelan and the Copper Trust. Judge Harney in the district court at Butte, awarded to him the Minnie Healey mine, valued at \$10,000,000, which Finelan and the trust have been trying to wrest from him.

The mine was originally the property of Finelan, who spent \$54,000 in working it, and then became discouraged because he did not find copper for his money and pains. He offered the property to Heinze for the sum he had expended in working it, and Heinze acquired the mine.

Heinze had faith in the mine and went to work on it with a vim. He soon struck a rich copper vein that sent the value of this purchase at a comparatively trifling sum up into the millions. Finelan then wanted to get back the mine and went into the courts, supported by the giant Copper Trust. Along with the right Heinze's proverbial good luck was with him, and he triumphed against the great odds.

Heinze made an unpretentious debut into the mining world at Butte in 1890. His subsequent elevation to the top notch has been as sensational as any recorded in the annals of mining operations. He is now only thirty-six years old, with a smooth, boyish face and an aggressive nature that has compelled those who opposed him to feel the power that may be in one determined man; and his makeup is that of a plunger.

He first went to work underground as an engineer for a company and made a close practical study of mining. After two years his grandmother died in New York and left him and his brothers, Arthur and Otto, \$50,000 each. F. August Heinze immediately went to Germany and studied two years in the leading school of mineralogy. Arthur Heinze studied law with particular reference to mining laws, and when his brother returned from Germany the two formed a partnership and went into mining in earnest.

Heinze is probably worth about \$25,000,000 in mining properties. He has had numerous hard tilts in the courts with the Copper Trust, but has beaten the big combine at every turn. Recently he won a suit against it that brought him in \$3,000,000. It is said that everything he touches turns to gold, or rather to copper, which is much the same thing if you have enough of it.

HARD ON THE DRUMMER.

A trade custom, that is getting to be quite common in the east, and which is westward taking its way,

will not be appreciated by the festive drummer, at whose solar plexus it is directed.

The new wrinkle has already been introduced in Spokane, by a large Omaha jobbing and dry goods manufacturing firm that has established a distributing agency there. This house offers to pay traveling expenses for all merchants in Washington and British Columbia who purchase goods from it, no matter what other business brings them to town.

Should this custom become general on this Coast, it would no doubt work a hardship on commercial travelers for a time, but in a prolonged contest between them and the fare-paying jobbers we should pin our faith to the irrepressible and ubiquitous drummer, who shows up every thirty days, gives the glad hand to the country merchant and his best smile to the waiter, and winks between bites at the waiter. He would have his birds in hand, while the jobber was shooting widely at them in the bush.

The ancient Modoc tribe has dwindled to 77 members, mostly women and sick or diseased children.
