LUMBER IN THE NORTHWEST.

There is so much said about forestry at present that there might be some fear lest the attempt to arouse public interest would be somewhat over-done, if it were not so readily apparent on every hand that the lumber business has reached a point in this country where the application of intelligent forestry principles must be made. As a striking illustration of the rapidity with which the demand for lumber has driven the lumbering business westward, Chief Gannett, of the new forestry bureau, who has been superintending department work in the northwest this season, affirms that the cut of timber in the state of Washington is already two billion feet a year, and that at the present rate the standing timber in Washington and Oregon will be gone within 50 years. This statement of the chief of the forestry bureau reminds the Philadelphia Record that a few years ago a lumber expert was employed by a large Pennsylvania firm to go out to Washington and Oregon and report on the quantity, quality and commercial status and possibilities of the standing timber in that region. After several months of careful investigation, this expert returned and reported to his employers that the lumber was there all right, but at least fifty years must elapse before it could be put to profitable use. This was the sober judgment of a practical man, sent out by a private firm with an eye to business, and yet in less than ten years the advance or material development in the northwest has completely outrun his calculations. Instead of waiting 50 years for the timber in Oregon and Washington to become available, it will be gone in 50 years unless the present method of lumbering can be changed.

The Southern Pacific Co has 829 locomotives on its Pacific system, and 100 new ones will be added to that number shortly. Of these about 100 now use petroleum for fuel, about twenty barrels per day each, and all will soon be equipped for burning oil. The petroleum product of California as developed at present will hardly supply the demand for the Southern Pacific alone, and it will be necessary to draw upon the Texas supply unless the output of the state first named is increased largely. While the price of oil seems to be too low for profitable production at present, the use for it are being extended; and after a while the supply will not be equal to the demand. The Standard Oil Co is doing much against the native product.

Suit has been commenced in the United States court at Carson City by Mrs. Ida McKinley, wife of

President McKinley, and Mrs. Mary B. Barber, against John Steele, William Hays and others, to recover possession of the Elkhart mine, one of the patented claims of the Canton Mining Company, on which, it is alleged, the defendants are operating, and also for \$10,000 damages, being for the ore taken out and shipped by the defendants during the period of the occupancy of the mine.

The bonds of administrators and executors have to be stamped now. Formerly under the war tax law they were exempt. In amending the law congress failed to renew the exemption, and the commissioner of the internal revenue has ruled that each administrator's and executor's bond requires a 50-cent stamp, the same as other bonds. Many unstamped bonds of the sort are being stamped at the clerk's office and are necessarily detained, pending compliance with the law.

Stephen T. Gage, so long connected with the S. P. Co's political department, has followed Manager Filmore into retirement, and will receive a life pension, \$1,000 per month for the remainder of this year and \$500 per month after that for life.

BORING FOR OIL.

Activity in Jackson County is Being Maintained.

Ashland July 28.—The activity in oil-boring projects in Jackson county is well maintained. The Southern Oregon company, the first to begin boring, representing the work steadily, working night and day shifts. This week the incorporation of the California company, under the laws of California was announced. It is to be known as the Ashland Oil Co. The principal owners, J. C. Hill is their superintendent here. They have large capital, and stock is not offered to the public. The most operating this company have operated extensively in the Kern River field. The Jackson County Oil company comprises a number of local capitalists. They have acquired an extensive territory of likely oil lands. The Eugene River Valley Oil company is a modified concern, which is making preparations to bore on some good ground.
