LAND MATTERS.

New Rules For Entries Under Timber and Stone Act.

The recent inspections of United States Commissioner Binger Hermann, of the general land office, in reference to additional precautions against fraudulent entries of public land under the timber and stone act, has already had its effect on professional locators, who, by reason of the many obligations they will henceforth have to assume will go rather slow. If the instructions issued by Commissioner Hermann are enforced, and there is no reason why they should not be, fraudulent entries will be reduced to a minimum, and the honest locator will stand some show.

"To the end that fraud may be prevented," writes Mr. Hermann to the registers and receivers of land offices, "you are directed to thoroughly cross-examine all claimants and proof witnesses in timber and stone entries and to issue no final certificates in any case, unless the proof submitted is positively satisfactory and you are convinced beyond all reasonable doubt that the entry is made in absolute good faith for the exclusive benefit of the entryman."

"In all cases where you have not evidence or sufficient or actual knowledge to justify rejection or proof, but have presumptive evidence, reliable information or good reason to believe that an entry is fraudulent, collusive or illegal, or is not made in good faith for the purpose contemplated by law, or the requirements of the law have not been fully or thoroughly complied with, you will receive the proof but suspend action thereon and transmit the same to this office with your opinion in each case."

"This office will not be satisfied with any proof taken in a perfunctory manner."

"To assist in the cross-examination of claimants, a list of questions approved by the secretary, to be propounded in addition to those required by the forms and regulations of department are enclosed."

The questions are 25 in number and pertain to the residence of the entryman, qualifications to make entry, financial condition, employment and what is intended to do with the land.

WHAT'S THE MATTER WITH 1900.

Agent Commissioner Hermann's order to suspend all proofs made during the present year, pending further investigations, the Brownsville Times wants to know why the proofs made during 1900 are not included.

Just why proofs made during

1901 should be suspended and investigated, and not those made during the preceding year, is not stated, although it is a well-known fact that as much fraud, if not more, was practiced in making proof upon timber lands in 1900 as this year, says the Times. There is certainly good ground for official investigation.

WATER RIGHT DEFINED.

The Oregon supreme court has handed down the following decision in the case of Asa L. Brown et al, respondents, vs L. B. Barker et al, appellants from Baker county, Robert Eakin, judge; affirmed. Opinion by Justice Moore.

Willow creek rises in the Blue mountains, and flows through the arid lands belonging to the parties in this suit and empties into Powder river. In the spring it carries 400 inches of water, miners' measurement, but in the summer only 30 inches. In 1864 plaintiff's predecessor diverted water for irrigation of his land and later increased the supply of water by tapping other streams and a swamp at the head of Willow creek. In 1892 defendant diverted 25 inches of water from Willow creek above plaintiff's and in 1896 diverted 40 inches. Plaintiff alleged that this was an infringement of their rights and brought suit for an injunction. The lower court found that the plaintiffs were entitled to 195 inches of water to July 15 and 180 inches thereafter, and enjoined the defendants from interfering with the flow of this quantity of water. The supreme court affirms this decree, laying down the following rule of law:

"The first settler upon public land through which a stream of water flows may either divert the water or use it for beneficial purpose, or exercise the common law right prevailing in the Pacific coast states where the modified rule of riparian ownership is still in force, and insists that the stream shall flow in its natural channel undiminished in quantity, except when applied to the natural use of the upper riparian proprietors, and for irrigation if the stream affords a sufficient quantity of water for the latter purpose."

We copy the following from a Missouri paper, public prayers having been offered in the state for rain: "The prayer of the righteous man availeth much." There are scoffers who smile at the crowds of sincere people who attend prayer meetings, believing that rain would come if asked for in the right spirit. A new law governs the transfer of business. It is a good law. It requires the seller of an establishment to make a statement under oath of all his creditors. If this statement is not correct the law makes him guilty of perjury. The buyer must notify each creditor that he is about buying the business. If he fails to do so, the omission is considered evidence of fraud, and creditors are not bound by the transaction. They can come in at any time and seize the stock of goods in satisfaction of their claims.
