A STREET FAIR.

Promoter of Such Enterprises
Interviews Business Men.

WE SHOULD ACT.

Eugene should have a street fair this fall. Roseburg, McMinnville, The Dalles and other towns in Oregon of like size have held successful street fairs and are now preparing to duplicate them this year, and there is no reason in the world why Eugene should not also successfully conduct one this year.

E. J. Arnold, promoter of street fairs and proprietor of out-door attractions, who was a leading spirit in getting up Roseburg's carnival last year and who has just closed a contract with the people there to furnish amusements this year, was in Eugene this morning interviewing our business men in regard to the proposition. He offers to furnish balloon ascensions every day, pictures, etc., to occupy the time of the crowds when the sports are not going on, for not more than \$500.

Of course Mr. Arnold is working up the proposition for what money there is in it for him, but a fair or celebration is a failure without something to occupy the attention of the crowds, as was demonstrated to a certain degree in this city last Fourth of July.

Even if this proposition is not accepted something should be done immediately looking to the holding of a fair. The first week in October is a very propitious time. Harvest is generally over by that time and people will attend for miles around. Our Fourth Regiment band would furnish music and if other bands are wanted they could be easily secured at a reasonable figure.

The usual sports, such as horse races, foot races, etc., could be arranged for and exhibitions of blooded stock, grains and fruit would be gladly furnished.

It has been suggested that \$1000 would cover the expense of a good street fair. For the first attempt at anything in that line we do not want to go into it too extensively. Make a small beginning and each year as we gain more experience larger and better fairs would be held.

Quite a number of the business men stated today that they are heartily in favor of a street fair and carnival, and we believe that every merchant in the city is willing to contribute to a fund to defray the expense of one.

A public meeting should be held soon to discuss the matter.

RAILROAD NEWS.—For the past week or ten days a special work train has been gathering up the light rails along the Woodburn-Springfield branch. These rails were formerly used on the old Narrow gauge system, but had to be discarded on the widening of the railroad gauge, and have since laid along the right of way. These rails are being shipped to Marysville, Placerville and other California points. This removes nearly all traces of the old narrow gauge system.

SUPPLIES FOR LUCKY BOY.—A wagon load of supplies of different kinds left this morning by team for the Lucky Boy mine at Blue River. The owners of this rich property spend an immense amount of money in Eugene for supplies, and our business men should see that the road from here to the mines is kept in good repair.

RATTLESAKE KILLED

James Gearhart Killed One 11
Years Old, Monday.

Last Monday while James Gearhart was walking along the road near his Spencer Creek home, all at once he heard the peculiar hiss of a rattlesnake, and jumped back, knowing that one of these poisonous snakes had struck at him and was preparing for another attack. He found a club near by and despatched the monster. It was a very large one, being eleven years old, having ten rattles and a button. Mr. Gearhart says some children were playing about sixty feet away, near Mr. Scholberg's residence. He killed one near the same spot about three or four years ago.

In the early settlement of the Spencer Creek country such men as the Baileys, Gearharts, Hadleys, Owens, Colemans, Heatherlys, McCollums and others used to make three or four hunts annually for these snakes. In one hunt they killed 220 rattlers. At least four dens were known to be located in that section, and a person had to approach these dens very carefully.

INJURED BY BICYCLIST.—It is reported that Lella Horn, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Horn, was quite severely injured by being knocked down by a reckless bicyclist. The little girl was dazed for awhile and received severe bruises and scratches on her face, arms and shoulders.
