THAT PORTLAND PARTY.

The Outcome a Failure as Predicted by Eugene People.

Prineville Review, August 1.

REPAIRS TO CENTRAL SCHOOL.

New Roof Being Put on and Rooms Being Papered.

Extensive repairs are being made to the Central school building, as per order of the school board, to be paid for by part of the \$20,000 raised by the recent issue of bonds subscribed for entirely by local people.

The exterior of the building has just been painted a dull gray color, the partition between the two south rooms on the second floor has been taken out to make an assembly room and now a new roof is being put on and the walls and ceiling of the interior are being papered and repainted. The paper is of a light green shade which will be very easy on the eyes of the pupils. Mr. McCady has charge of the papering and painting, while W. T. Campbell is superintending the work of putting on the roof.

This morning's rain took the workmen by surprise. The old roof had just been torn off and the new one had not been completed when the rain came. The new paper was damaged somewhat but not to any great extent.

When these repairs are completed the old building will present a much more attractive appearance, especially on the interior. The pretty wall paper is a great improvement over the spotted and dirty plaster.

The building will hereafter be known as the High School building. It will be occupied by the High School besides two or three grades of the grammar schools.
