OWN THE WORLD.

Petaluma Courier: The firm of Miller & Lux own 14,530,000 acres of land, nearly all of it unimproved and used for grazing. The vast area held by this firm is not conceivable to one who has not traveled through the state. It is equal to the area of New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut together. It is half the size of New York and three times the size of New Jersey. It is about the size of West Virginia and an eighth the entire area of California. It is as large as Greece, four times the size of Alsace and Lorraine, and but little smaller than Ireland, and one-third the size of England and Wales together. There is only one thing that Henry Miller, the surviving member of the firm of Miller & Lux, becomes nervous over, and that is discussion of the size of his holdings.

Says the San Jose Cal. Mercury: There is promise of good to the prune growers in the drought now occurring in the East if they have the good sense to hang together and thus be in a position to reap the full benefit of the situation. The apple crop will be very light and consequently the supply of dried apples will not be so heavy as usual. All through New England and New York there have been reports of a small crop of apples this year and the market has been counting upon the good crops reported in Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Arkansas and Kansas, but the hot weather has made terrific inroads upon the apple orchards of those states. Fruit is dropping badly and what remains on trees is not maturing well. The summer apples usually so plentiful in the market at this season are very scarce. This is why there is such a good sale for California fruit in the East at present—this and the fact that the watermelon crop is very light and of poor quality. Everything points to a scarcity of dried fruit next winter and to a consequent strong demand for prunes. By sticking together and marketing their crop through the association the prune growers would be in a position to get all the market would stand for their fruit. If they do not do so and get into the hands of brokers and speculators the latter will make the profits and the growers will not. There never was or never will be a better opportunity for the growers to make themselves independent of the forces that have lived upon them and absorbed the profits of their business than is offered by the conditions prevailing this season. All that is required is for the growers to stick together loyally and trust to the wisdom and the judgment of those whom they have chosen to manage the affairs of the association.
