A TOWN BURNED.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, August 13.—The town of Earsund, on the shores of the North Sea, was almost wiped out by fire last night. Twelve hundred people or more are rendered homeless and there is much suffering.

THE EASTERN STRIKE

PITTSBURG, Pa, August 13.—The officials of the Amalgamated Association are urging Chicago steel workers to join the big strike.

During last night the strikers gained strength here, at McKeesport and at Wheeling.

The Bellaire plant also closed down last night. The steel men are making desperate efforts to re-open their plants, but with little prospect of success.

COAL SUPPLY DIMINISHING.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 13.—On account of the big strike of water front workers and other labor organizations in this city the coal supply is diminishing rapidly, most of the bunkers in the city already being empty. No coal is being received.

Several cargoes have arrived in port but none are allowed to be discharged.

Retailers have reduced all orders one-half.

A JOKE.

A TRAIN ROBBERY.

DENVER, Texas, August 13.—Five desperate men held up a train near Atoba today with a fusillade of shots. They searched all the passengers, who were badly frightened, dynamited the express safes and took the contents. They held the train for two hours and escaped, but only secured a few hundred dollars for their trouble.

A RAILROAD WRECK.

Springfield-Woodburn Train Was Ditched Near Shaw.

SILVERTON, Or, Aug 13.—Yesterday afternoon train No 45 on the Woodburn-Springfield branch was wrecked on Hornesbee Bend, one mile south of Shaw station. The wreck was caused by a defective cattle guard. No one was injured. Both branch trains were delayed seven hours. The wreck was cleaned up at 7 p m.

MORE STORE ROOM.—To make more room for his big stock of goods, Ed Hanson, the clothier, will immediately take out the partition in the rear of his store in the Matlock building, thus adding 20 feet to the room and relieving the crowded condition of the store to a considerable extent. Three big arc lights will be installed in the store and after night it will present a brilliant appearance.

SHIPMENTS WILL GO NORTH.

Booth-Kelly Co. Will Probably Ship Lumber Via Portland.

BARBED WIRE TELEPHONE.—The system of telephoning on a barbed wire fence is being tried near Athens, and to a certain extent, is successful. A strand of ordinary wire is employed and insulators and circuit are in operation between that town and Hillsdale, on the Washington & Columbia railroad. OUR TWO SCHOOLS

Editor Hoefler Still Raving and Using Hard Language.

PRaises EDITOR KINCAID.

Editorial in Salem Journal, Aug. 12.

The Journal theologian pointed out that an Eugene Divinity school advertised a very close umbilical connection with the State University. In fact, anyone who will send for its annual catalog cannot tell whether it is advertising the faculty and attractions of the one or the other, and the president of the State University said facetiously at the Commencement exercises of the theological institution that he hardly knew which concern he was at the head of, although he and the faculty probably have no doubt as to where their emoluments come from. There probably isn't a cent in the divinity business for any of the professors, and it must be assumed their services in graduating bachelors of divinity is a work of grace, pure and unadulterated love for the sacred cause of religion.

The Eugene editors, excepting old horse-sense Harrison Kincaid, construe the Journal's remarks into an attack on the State University and say all sorts of pleasant things about the editor, who is not a public official, but only a theologian who chops his own stovewood and keeps his mind clear of weeds by hoeing his own garden. When he points out some abuse in connection with public affairs he is accustomed to have the peewees and shags of newspaperdom sneering at him and telling the public what a good fellow he is. Just the same, the shaking up of the Eugene Divinity factory will do all the gentlemen good, although we don't expect them to grow appreciative enough to pass The Journal's resolution of thanks. It is very nice to roast the iniquitous Friars in the Philippines for controlling the higher institutions of learning, to denounce it as a manifestation of church and state, to get up an A P A political movement here in Oregon to protect the dear people against the awful possibilities of desecularized education, and then to turn right about, grind out parchments for a home-made brand of theology "on the edge of the University campus" with about half the faculty of the State University as the drawing cards in the game.

Sorry, but we haven't got the Indiana rubber smile of the Eugene editors to look the people square in the face and soberly tell 'em its just the cheese. In the mean time, one of the professors who has been drawing \$3000 and acting as main spoke in the Divinity factory, besides working the states biologist at large, has been elected to succeed Prof Ole Luggen, in a Scandinavian college in Minnesota. As a matter of fact, besides President Strong, Prof Young and about two others, the whole State University faculty could be revamped without any perceptible loss to the glory of education of the state.

The above needs very little comment at our hands. The faculty of the U O is composed of learned men well suited to the respective chairs they occupy. Hoefler is probably jealous, as he would like to be professor of strawberries or have some other important chair thrown at him. The professor in question only gets \$2,000 per annum instead of \$3,000, Mr H. Good bye, old man. Eat shredded biscuit and less rock oysters and you will feel better and print less nonsense.

THE SHUHLAW ROAD.—Roseburg Plaiddealer: Regarding the newly proposed Florence wagon road mentioned on our first page, we are informed by Judge Thompson, that the matter will be fully investigated before one cent will be appropriated toward its construction by Douglas county and no more definite assurance than this was given the party who called here to lay the matter before the county board. Since there is a lack of harmony in the project among the people the most interested and since Eugene and Lane county would be almost solely benefited by the project it is not likely that any action whatever will be taken in the matter by the Douglas county court.

BERKELEY SUMMER SCHOOL.—Prof Luella Clay Carson writing from Portland to the GUARD asking to have her paper sent to that city says: "I hope everything in Eugene is prosperous. I returned to Portland on the 9th, after a very interesting stay in Berkeley. The summer session at the State University is very successful and is growing in members and influence every year. ROSEBURG STREET FAIR.

Railroad Rates Fixed—Advertising Banner Sent to Eugene.

A large banner bearing the dates of the Roseburg street fair and second annual carnival has been sent to Eugene, to be suspended in a prominent place, and the posters have been sent out in every direction. They will soon be followed by the premium lists.

In the matter of rates the Southern Pacific has been even more liberal than was anticipated. A letter from C H Markham, general passenger agent, quotes rates from Portland of \$5 for the round trip, Ashland \$4.25 for the round trip and Eugene \$2.25 for the round trip. Further than this the company has also agreed to a rate of one and one-third fare for the round trip from all points between and including Cottage Grove and Glendale. With plenty of advertising, these low rates should bring big crowds to the fair.
