CITY COUNCIL.

Ordinance Raising Saloon License to \$1000 Introduced.

SEWER AND SIDEWALK MATTERS.

Regular monthly meeting of the city council was held in the city hall last evening. Mayor Christman, Councilmen Green, Osburn, Peter, Roney and Barker were present. After the minutes were read and approved, the report of the finance committee was read and approved.

Mr. Roney reported the work done by the street committee showing that 9,784 feet of lumber was used last month in construction of crosswalks.

The agreement of M. D. Bissell to deliver 7000 yards of crushed rock at 77 cents per yard, terms of which the GUARD recently printed, was read and approved.

The health committee reported the condition at Bangs' stable unchanged. The viewers report favorable for sewer on Eleventh, Hillyard and Twelfth streets as proposed and established by ordinance No. 375 and amended by ordinance No. 378, was read and approved. The viewers were S. M. Moran, L. Bilyeu and R. M. Day.

H. Gordon and others presented petition asking the council to open alley from Eleventh to Thirteenth street between Willamette and Oak streets. Petition granted and survey ordered.

Grading and graveling of Obshire street reconsidered and petition and remonstrance referred to street committee for investigation with authority to report back to council.

Petition of Wm. Kenshaw, G. G. Gross and J. H. McClung for sewer in the alley between Olive and Willamette streets running from the sewer on Sixth street to Fifth street. Petition granted and survey ordered.

The marshal was notified to serve written notice to remove nuisance from Bangs' stable. Bills were presented and referred to finance committee.

The city attorney was instructed to draw an ordinance imposing fine for not connecting with sewer. An ordinance to secure speedy repair and construction of sidewalks was passed, and fixing penalty for non-compliance of not less than \$5 nor more than \$20 and the acts of action.

HIGH LICENSE ORDINANCE.

An ordinance was introduced during the meeting raising the saloon license from \$400 to \$1000 per year for the privilege of selling wine, spirituous and malt liquors, and from \$200 to \$500 per year for selling malt liquors alone. On motion by Mr. Roney and second by Mr. Osburn the ordinance was laid on the table. The vote on the motion stood: Aye, Roney, Osburn, Peter, No, Barker, Green.

A special meeting of the council will be held tonight. A feature of the Buffalo Exposition will be a race between automobiles representing all nations.
