The Tax Rolls Will Remain Closed Until Sept. 15th.

Per announcement the tax rolls were closed by Sheriff Withers last evening. The amount of taxes due is a little more than \$19,600, some \$4,000 more than at this time last year. The delinquent roll will now be made up by the sheriff and his deputies. This work will take until about September 15th, when they will be opened again for a month longer, when all remaining unpaid will be advertised and the property sold.

PRUNES.—Special agents of the California Cured Fruit association have just made returns of the estimate of the crops about to be harvested, and give the yield of the entire state at about 55,000,000 pounds. The total state crop last year was about 170,000,000 pounds. Computations made give the total amount of prunes now in the hands of the association at 38,000,000 pounds, so there is in sight an available supply of 93,000,000 pounds. Prunes are selling rapidly, and it is expected that the old stock will be disposed of inside of 30 days and at the 1 cent basis.
