ANXIOUS TO COME HOME

Several Thousand Gold Hunters Will Come Back From Nome.

San Francisco, Aug. 27.—Officers of the steamer St. Paul bring the information that at least 6000 or 7000 persons intend to come back to the United States from Nome the present season though it is doubtful whether the steamers now plying in Alaska will be able to bring such a large number before navigation closes.
