stop at Uniontown, Wash.

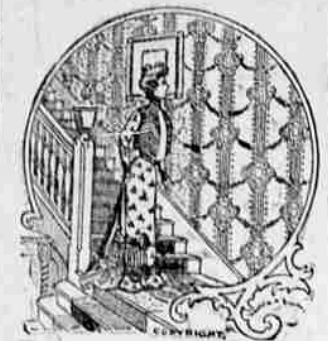
Frank Blair and Lake Dorris are

## MANY IMPROVEMENTS.
