New York Greeks are happy—at least they have an orthodox priest of the Greek church to minister to their spiritual necessities. The only drawback, from an American point of view, is the name, Archimandrite Anthemos Joanides.

Lane county pioneers, who have in mind the once sprightly, active form of M. G. McCarty, will at least give a passing thought of regret at the misfortune and sad ending of his later years. It was his fate. It is useless to fix the blame.

In France, avowed anarchist may be imprisoned or banished. The newspapers are forbidden to publish accounts of their trials or of their executions, if convicted. Thus the criminals are prevented from posing as heroes.

British troops in South Africa complain that they find no enemy to fight notwithstanding there are still many Boers under arms. It is a country of great distances and the Boers are scattered in small commands, besides they have thorough knowledge of the country and are among their own people. It is hard for an enemy to catch them.

A Baker City man got a scare the other day that will last him the remainder of his life. In moving a twenty-five hundred pound safe he stooped his head by its side to observe the position of the track on which it was being moved, when it careened and fell toward him, forcing his head through the lath of the newly plastered wall.

It would be well for the newspaper readers to stop and study the meaning of that celebrated loop made by the Brooklyn at Santiago. Dispatches are mentioning it already, and in the days immediately to follow, loops will be described and pictured until the mind is weary. Schley made a loop. Suffice it to state that the loop meant a temporary turning of the flagship from the enemy. Sampson says it was cowardice, while Schley says it was merely rational precaution.

The irony of fate is fully illustrated by an occurrence in Pennsylvania. A bookbinder died in Brooklyn, New York, in 1893, leaving an estate of forty thousand dollars. The executors were unable to find trace of any heir until the other day when they learned that a distant relative, a woman, had died in a Pennsylvania poor house last November. Who can estimate the happiness such a legacy would have given the poor woman, perhaps giving her a long lease of life instead of a pauper's grave?

The tragic death of President McKinley is responsible for a scheme to change the names of the Philippine Islands to McKinley Islands, with individual islands of the group named after the commissioners and generals who have occupied prominent places in the deplorable war in the islands. It

looks like a scheme to honor the living, more than the dead. Even should congress consent to such a change the old names would stick. The population of the Philippines will remain alien to all intents and purposes. And no difference what laws congress may enact that population will use the old names. To them new ones would be entirely without significance. It would be about as appropriate to ask the people of Eugene to spell and pronounce the name of the town backward. There would be just as much significance.

A VETERAN WORKER.

The Oregonian Pays the Old Pioneer, M. Wilkins, a Deserved Compliment.

Oregonian, Sept. 29.
M. Wilkins, Oregon's greatest state fair worker, was a visitor at the fair grounds today. He is 83 years old and one of the organizers of the state agricultural society at Oregon City in 1880. In the 40 years that have elapsed since that time he has missed but three seasons of the fair, but thinks this will be his last. He was for many years president of the agricultural society and was a member of the old board of managers until the state assumed control of the fair under the new law enacted in 1899. For several years Mr. Wilkins and John Minto were the main supporters of the state fair.

Mr. Wilkins was Oregon's representative at the first international exposition in America, held in Philadelphia in 1876. He put up an Oregon exhibit again at New Orleans in 1884, and made several trips to Chicago in 1893 in the interests of Oregon. His son, Jasper Wilkins, of Coquille, has taken up the state fair work and is a member of the present board.

Mr. Wilkins is suffering from paralysis and it was with some difficulty that he made his way about the grounds. He walked unassisted, however, and enjoyed many a handshake with old friends. An informal reception was given the aged friend of Oregon industries this afternoon at the Wilkins tent on the fair grounds.
