BOHEMIA RAILROAD.

General Opinion That It Will Be Built Soon.

SURVEYORS AT WORK.

COTTAGE GROVE, Oct 21.— Lots of railroad talk in this town since the surveying party arrived last week. This morning they drove the first stake between the Southern Pacific depot and Long's store, and started northeast through the Joe Perkins place. People generally think the road will go through, as the immense timber interests of the Booth-Kelly Co and others, on Row River and Mosby Creek are sufficient to make business for a road from 15 to 20 miles in the direction of Bohemia and those who are in a position to know, disclose that there is paying ore enough in Bohemia to justify a road being built there to carry in supplies and bring out concentrates. Even the chronic kicker is silent today.

NEW WATER WORKS.

Water has been turned into the pipe-line from the new reservoir west of town and the head is so much higher that water overflows from the old reservoir east of here. Boys Not Showing Up as Well as They Ought.

WEATHER TOO WARM.

A correspondent to the Portland Telegram from the University has the following in Saturday's issue:

Practice during the past week has not been as favorable as the coach and management had a right to expect. The squad is not getting into condition as they should for the amount of work which has been given them. The poor condition of the men is, however, due very much to the weather conditions, and it is expected that when the cool weather comes, the men will round up in very fair form.

The team is not receiving the support from the students which it merits, and this is not encouraging either to the managers or players.

Some of the new men are not showing up as well as was expected, and their places may be filled with men who are lighter in weight but have had more experience. Captain Ziegler has not been showing up in his usual form. In fact, Ziegler has not been feeling well since school opened, and will likely not play in the first game, which will be played with Chemawa October 26. He will, however, should his condition improve, play in the game on November 2nd against the M A A C. Ziegler's place at end in the Chemawa game will most likely be taken by McBride, who was the star end on the O A C team a few years ago. Mr McBride is a good tackler and covers the ground like a footballer. The playing of Kuhlman has not been up to expectations, and chayer or Wagner will give him a hard fight for the place at center. Kuhlman was injured several days ago, while practicing, and may not play again this season. [Kuhlman has decided not to play this year, we understand.—ED GUARD.]

Among the new men who are showing up back of the line is Starr, a freshman of whom Coach Smith expects some good playing before the season ends. The quarter-backs Adams and Murphy are not getting down to work as they should. They fumble the ball too much. In either Henderson or Templeton Smith thinks he has a worthy successor to Payne. Both men are fine punters, but Henderson seems to be more speedy, while Templeton is the more aggressive in line bucking. Henderson injured his neck a few days ago while practicing and has not been able to practice. He will, however, commence active work again the first of the week.

Commencing Tuesday evening the men have been lined up each evening for two short halves. The length of the halves will be gradually increased as the men become more hardened.
