ROSEBURG, Oct. 18.—William Lertwell, charged with assault on William Horn, was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary by Judge Hamilton yesterday afternoon, after the jury had been deliberating for eight or nine hours.

Orvil Perdue, convicted of stealing cattle from Gaddis Bros., was sentenced this forenoon by Judge Hamilton to a term of two years, as was also Jesse Garvia, a colored cook, for robbing the dining car "Yosemite." The three prisoners will be taken to Salem tomorrow by Sheriff Parrott.

### Hop Crop Notes.

Fortunately this class of dealers are scarce. Why dealers are continually representing to their eastern houses that they can buy hops at low prices is not to be understood. In the first place it is not so, and in the second place a rising market is always better for speculators and dealers. By this it will be seen that dealers are standing in their own light.
