STRANGE STORY OF A CLOCK.

Russell De Lashmuth, who was stricken with paralysis last Tuesday at his home in Oswego, died Saturday, says the Evening Telegram. Dr. M. C. Strickland, who was Mr. De Lashmuth's physician, tells a strange story connected with the De Lashmuth family, which is vouched for by Mrs. Hellen.

In 1854, De Lashmuth purchased a clock in Oregon City which he placed upon his mantel. The clock stood in its old position for years and kept perfect time until one day in the year 1886 it suddenly stopped. Some time afterward news was received that De Lashmuth's youngest son had died the day the clock stopped. Every effort was made to make the old timepiece go again, but all attempts proved futile, and Mrs. Hellen presented Mr. De Lashmuth with a smaller clock. On last Tuesday when Mr. De Lashmuth received his paralytic stroke, the small clock stopped, and the old clock, which had not run a minute since 1876 gathered itself together, emitted a ghastly sound, and gave six solemn strokes and then stopped. The strokes undoubtedly meant that De Lashmuth had but six days to live, but he expired a few hours ahead of time.

IVEY IS FOR SUMMERS.

Collector of Customs of Alaska J. W. Ivey, who is in Portland at present, in speaking of the race for the gubernatorial chair, declared that Governor Geer will not receive a renomination. He says he is advocating the cause of General Owen Summers.

"General Summers," said he, "deserves recognition at the hands of the state. He led the Second Oregon Regiment through the war in the Philippines and returned with a fine record. The achievements of the regiments added new honors to the flag, and it would be a fitting tribute for the people of Oregon to elect General Summers governor."

BAKER COUNTY FINANCES.

The La Grande Observer says: A gentleman in this city who has in his possession considerable Baker

If the line is busy a buzzer prevents him from saying a word or understanding what is said. The system has been tried in New Bedford and works to a charm. There is but one person at the central station and she can walk around the block at any time, and put a stop to the use of the phones. In that city the new invention has already cut down the prices of the phones to users fifty per cent.

Gov. T. T. Geer has appointed Wm. O. Minor, of Heppner; Frank Brown, of North Yamhill, and C. M. Cartwright, of Hay Creek, delegates-at-large to the National Live Stock Association which meets in Chicago on December 3d, for a four days' session.

The gamblers of New York City lost \$700,000 on the recent municipal election. The Wall Street operators won most of the money. Croker lost \$150,000 of his own money.

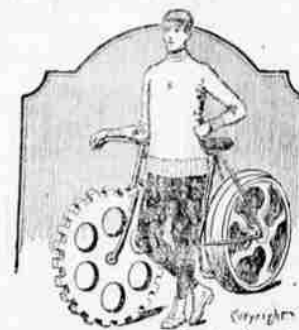
