HOP MARKET.

Rapid Advance Reported By Local Dealers.

ENGLISH MARKET STRONGER.

Salem Statesman Nov. 20.

The hop market is assuming more life than has been noted for a month, and prices are beginning to advance, as a result of the sudden strengthening of the English market, where, in spite of the phenomenal crop of 1901, the market has, according to advices received by leading dealers yesterday, advanced 5 shillings. This has startled American brewers, and they are now coming into the market to supply themselves with the necessary stocks, and naturally, the growers who still hold their hops, will secure better prices for their product.

The Horst & Lachmund Company yesterday purchased a large lot of hops at 10 1/2 cents a pound, that a week ago, could have been bought for 10 cents, and other lots have been sold in the local market at good prices, a large number of sales changing hands yesterday. To such an extent has trading in hops grown lately that there are now 15,000 bales—about 20 per cent of the crop of 1901—in the hands of growers in Oregon, and those dealers holding the stocks, will make a handsome profit on their holdings, to reimburse them for losses sustained during the past few years.

Mr L L Lachmund, of the Horst & Lachmund Company, says that higher prices can now be confidently looked forward to and that the low prices, the result of the work of short sellers, are a thing of the past for this season.

CONTRACT SIGNED.

Mr. Wagon Has Found Woolen Mill Bonus Satisfactory.

MEETINGS TODAY.

A meeting of a number of the largest subscribers to the woolen mill bonus was held in the parlors of the First National bank this forenoon to confer with Mr Wagon. A committee, consisting of J H McClung, F E Dunn, R McMurphey, S B Eakin, F M Wilkins and J M Shelley, was appointed to draw up a contract as stipulated in the subscription paper and at another meeting at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon was signed by Mr Wagon and the members of the committee.

Mr Wagon today talked with several prominent builders in regard to the erection of the main building, which will be a frame, two stories high and 60x110 feet in dimensions, and the contract will be let as soon as all bids are in. The old furniture factory, near the site of the new mill, will be used for the dye room and picking department.

THE CONTRACT.

Following is the contract drawn up and signed today:

This contract and agreement made and entered into this 21st day of November, 1901, by and between H D Wagon for himself and associates, and any corporation that may be formed for the herein-after named objects and purposes, of the first part and J H McClung, S B Eakin, R McMurphey, J M Shelley, F E Dunn, and F M Wilkins, selected and authorized by and acting for the subscribers of the subsidy, fund and money herein-after mentioned of the second part witnesseth:

That the said H D Wagon so acting of the first part for the consideration to be paid as herein-after mentioned promises and agrees to build, erect, construct and equip with all the proper and necessary up-to-date machinery, fixtures, apparatus and appliances, in Eugene, Lane county Oregon, at and upon a site on the mill race on or near where the old furniture factory used by Day & Henderson now stands a good three-story woolen mill; the building for said woolen mill shall be a good substantial frame building 60 feet wide by 110 feet long, and two stories high, to be finished in a good and substantial manner proper and suitable for the purposes of said woolen mill building. Said building to be erected, constructed and com-

pleted and said woolen mill to be finished and completed and ready to run and operate on, or before the last day of July, 1902.

The capacity of said woolen mill when so completed and running in its full capacity, that is—with all said machinery, said three-story set and all other machinery, and when in full operation, that is, ten hours a day, shall be such as the pay roll thereof shall be about \$5000.00 per month.

And it is agreed that said woolen mill shall be so constructed and completed at such site and location and shall be and remain where so erected and completed and shall not be removed or taken away or dismantled for a period of, at least, 20 years from the said date of its completion. Provided, however that if the said mill should permanently cease to operate, as a woolen mill, within one year from the time the same is completed and begins to operate the said party of the first part shall pay back to the parties of the second part, as trustees for said subscription of said subsidy 50 per cent of said \$5000.00; and if said mill should cease permanently to operate, as a woolen mill, within two years from the said date of its said completion, as aforesaid, then the party of the first part shall pay back to the second parties, as such trustees, 60 per cent of said \$5000.00; and if the same permanently ceases to operate within a 3 year period thereafter for five years a 75 per cent shall be returned to said second party as such trustees; and if the said mill shall permanently cease to operate as a woolen mill within the second five years after its said completion, then the said parties of the first part shall return to said second party 15 per cent of said \$5000.00. Damage or destruction by fire, or the elements excepted.

The parties of the second part in consideration of the said erection, construction, equipment and completion of said woolen mill of the above named kind and capacity, and in consideration of the premises hereby covenant, promise and agree to pay to the said H D Wagon, his assigns or legal representatives, the said sum of \$6000.00, as a subsidy and bonus therefor; and promise and agree to pay the said sum to the said H D Wagon, his assigns or legal representatives, on or before the said 1st day of July, 1902, or when and as soon as said woolen mill is completed and in operation.

In WITNESS WHEREOF, the said parties have hereunto set their hands and seals and executed this contract in duplicate this, 21st day of November, 1901.

BODY OF LONG-LOST MAN.

It Now Seems J. R. Bucknum, of Harrisburg, Met With Foul Play.

Harrisburg, Nov 20.—Great excitement was created here today when word was brought in that the body of J R Bucknum, who mysteriously disappeared on November 18, 1898, while hunting deer in the Cascade mountains, on Shotgun creek, about 20 miles east of here, had been found. The news was brought here by a party of hunters, Messrs Howard, Hanchett and Gamm, of Junction City. They state that while hunting on Shotgun creek they met a man named Martin, who told them he had found a grave and had dug into it and found a skeleton and portions of a red sweater. Bucknum wore a red sweater at the time he disappeared. The men said that Martin lived near Crawfordville. Mr Bucknum was a prominent citizen of Harrisburg and one of the owners of the Harrisburg sawmill.

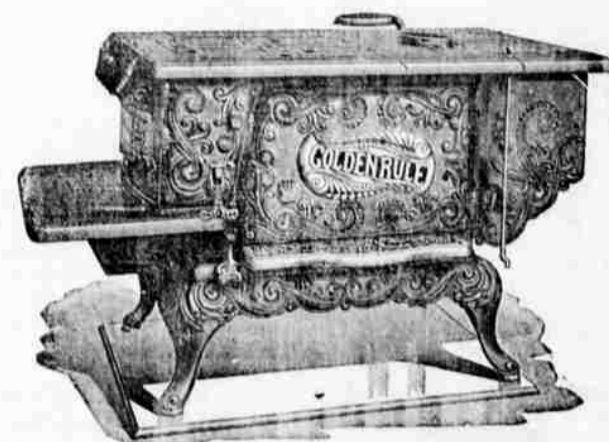
