THE COTTAGE GROVE
Leader has this bit of sensational news:
Last Friday night about 12:30 o'clock
one of the most disgusting scenes that
ever occurred in Cottage Grove took
place. At this hour of the night there
were very few people on the streets
and the disgraceful scene was witness-
ed by only two or three persons, and
perhaps the parties implicated did not
know that anyone saw them. A
young woman in a drunken condition
came staggering out of one of the sal-
oons by the assistance of two of the
"young sports" of the town and
started down the street reeling from
one side of the walk to the other, and
at times she was almost beyond the
control of her escorts. Twice she fell,
but by assistance she arose and was
hurried along. The parties implicated
are all known.

BOHEMIA ROAD SURVEY.—Yester-
day's Telegram: W F Morphy, gen-
eral manager of the Cottage Grove &
Bohemia Railroad Company, was in
the city yesterday from Cottage
Grove, from which point he is super-
intending preliminaries to the con-
struction of the railroad that will give
the rich Bohemia mining district
communication with the rest of the
world. Mr Morphy, who represents
the Eastern syndicate that is furnish-
ing the money for this railroad enter-
prise, reports that the survey is already
completed a distance of 25 miles. As
the entire road will be but 35 miles in
length, there remains but 10 more
miles to survey.

SCRAPING UP MUD.—This morning,
as announced in yesterday's GUARD,
the city commenced scraping the mud
off Willamette street. Carson Mathew-
son's big team of four gray horses at-
tached to the city scraper finished two
blocks and a half of Willamette street
by noon. The street will be scraped
from the depot to Tenth street, a dis-
tance of six blocks, and Ninth street
will be scraped from Oak to Olive
streets—two blocks. A part of the
mud is being used to fill up the old
fire cisterns and the remainder is be-
ing hauled to fill up the low places in
the rear of Bangs' stable along Olive
street.
