PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT AND GENERAL MILES.

We are under obligations to Register "Impressions" for calling attention to a misstatement in an editorial headed "Is our President a Hypocrite?" in yesterday's DAILY GUARD.

Our reference to the greeting of Admirals Dewey and Schley at President Roosevelt's New Year's reception should have applied to General Miles, commander of the army. General Miles had congratulated Admiral Schley on the finding of the naval board of inquiry as to the Sampson-Schley investigation in terms that any brother officer could appropriately make use of where the honor of a brother officer had been fully vindicated from an unfounded charge of cowardice.

Then, after assuming full responsibility for the public rebuke to the highest officer of the army the President greeted him a few days afterward with every show of cordiality. Is it to be wondered at that the old general who had faced rebel shot on half a hundred battlefields, with several wounds as mementoes of the conflict, received the presidential advances "sternly and without evidence of gratification?"

AN OVERDONE DIVORCE COMPLAINT.

A San Francisco ship-captain is suing his wife for divorce on the numerous grounds that she is intensely jealous and had him watched by private detectives in the effort to prove him unfaithful; that he took her a trip on the steamer but she made herself so obnoxious that the owners gave peremptory orders that she should not be allowed on the vessel. Then she had slapped his face several times and threatened to shoot him.

Still the captain gets in a joker by further alleging that his wife swallowed a powder in his presence one day and then informed him that she had taken poison, thereby causing him great mental anguish. A witness fails in one thing may well be doubted in all. After such a recital of domestic infidelity how could her swallowing poison cause him "great mental anguish?" The captain has overdone his case.

STATE LIQUOR-SELLING PROFITS.

The South Carolina dispensary method of handling liquor sales—all liquor is sold by the state at designated dispensaries—has proved successful not only as an effective means of curtailing the liquor habit, but as a state revenue producer.

When the measure was under consideration Governor Tillman predicted that it would give the state from a half million to a million dollars' profit. The annual report

of the state board of directors, just made, shows that purchases of liquor during the year amounted to \$1,817,973 and the gross sales, exclusive of beer by beer dispensers, were \$2,328,981. The total net profit is \$545,248.

This is a good showing from a financial standpoint, still it may be questioned if high license would not have been equally effective as a revenue producer. The law will stand or fall as it proves a curb to the appetites of South Carolina citizens.
