Still Working on Rich Ore at
Lucky Boy.

NO SNOW AT THE MINES

C. H. Park, the mining capitalist, is just down from the Blue River mines. He states that he has a good force of men at work on his Treasure mine and the tunnel has been run in to a distance of 300 feet and still progressing. The tunnel is at a depth of 275 feet. Mr. Park expects to keep his men at work all winter, the weather not being severe enough to check operations. There is no snow at the mines, Mr. Park says, only a little on the highest points of the mountains. The winter has been an excellent one for work so far and it is hoped will continue as it has been.
