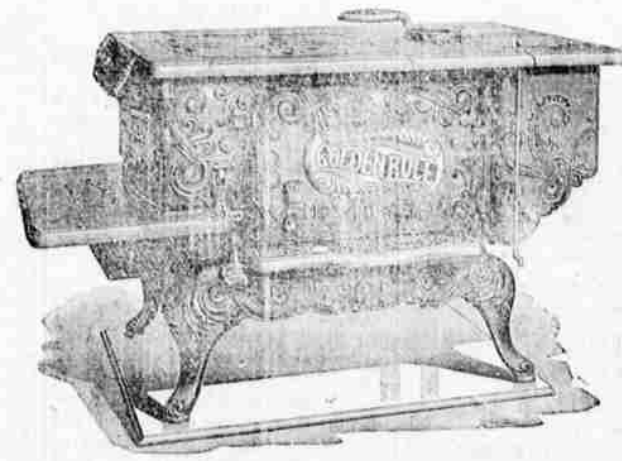

NEW YORK HORROR.

Railroad Trains Collided in the Tunnel Under the City.

MANY COOKED BY STEAM.

NEW YORK, Jan 8.—A horrible collision occurred between passenger trains in the New York Central Railroad tunnel, underneath the city, this forenoon.

The steam connections about the boilers were broken when the tunnel filled with hot, scalding steam literally cooking many to death and injuring others beyond the possibility of recovery.

Twenty-eight were taken out dead.

ROSEATE STEEL TRUST VIEW.

President Schwab defends the steel trust with the assertion that it is a necessity under present industrial conditions.

WANT RAILROAD SECRETS.
