PHILOLOGIAN ELECTION.

The Philologist Society met Friday night with a good attendance. Mr J Templeton gave a declamation followed by an extemporaneous address by Mr Gray, subject, "A vacation at Coorg."

Mr McArthur revived the current events. The debate was on the subject, "Resolved, that the U S should adopt a system of ship subsidies." The affirmative was upheld by Mr Hemenway and H Stockton, the negative, by Mr Tomlinson and Mr Fisher. The debate was thrown open to the house and Messrs Gray, Blythe and Moulton spoke from the floor. The president briefly summarized the debate and rendered his decision in favor of the negative. Cash prizes are being offered for contributions in the shape of stories and poems, and it is expected that this year's annual will equal, like productions of the Eastern colleges.

The Laureans met last evening in short session with Mr Wold in the chair. The program of the evening was postponed until next Friday and the evening was devoted to discussions concerning means to renovate and re-organize the Laurean Society. At present literary society work at the University is at a very low ebb, a state of affairs most proportionally detrimental both to the interests of the University and the work of the students. With the coming of the new year, the Laureans have taken a step to put society to the front. A committee was appointed to revise the constitution and by-laws. The society will hereafter be exclusive and will be run on a strict financial and parliamentary basis.

At the meeting of the athletic board of the associated students yesterday evening Elmer M Wright was selected manager of the U O football team for 1923. Mr Wright is registered from Union, Oregon, and entered the University in September, 1900. His record as a student, though not exceptional, has been good.

At the meeting of the county commissioners' court adjourned last evening until the next regular meeting which occurs on the first Wednesday in February. At the session just adjourned a large amount of business was transacted. Besides allowing the usual number of bills, hearing petitions for new roads, road repairs etc, the court read the annual reports from the road supervisors of the many districts throughout the county, appointed judges and clerks of election and jurors to serve at the circuit court during the ensuing year.
