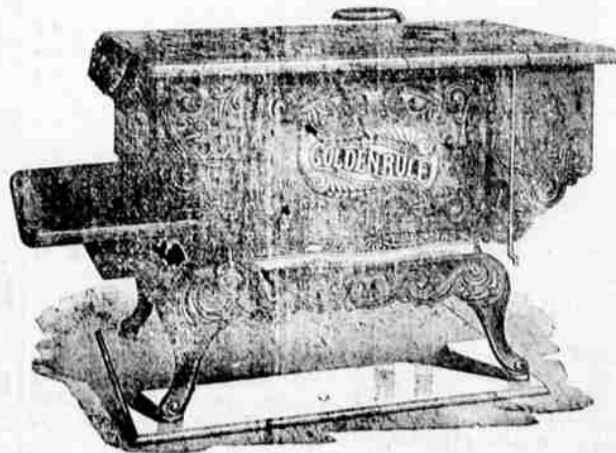

LONDON, Jan 13—Miss Portia Knight, formerly a resident of Salem, Oregon, has been paid one thousand pounds by the Duke of Manchester to keep the breach of promise case, with which she threatened him, out of court.

A NOTED BRIGAND.

BUCHAREST, Roumania, Jan 13—Luke Babeanu a noted brigand has been captured by the authorities.

During the many years that he has operated in the mountains conservative estimates place no less than 520 murders and 3000 robberies to his charge. He will be executed. Babeanu denies any complicity in the abduction of the American missionary, Miss Stone.

NORFOLK, Virginia, Jan 13—The United States will seize the West India island Cebula at once. The steamer Leonidas with a force of marines and field pieces sailed this morning with that object in view.

CAUGHT AT ALBANY.

The Fellow Who Stole Clint Montgomery's Watch Brought Back.

Yesterday morning Chief of Police Scott received word from L. McCaine, chief of police at Albany, that the fellow who stole a watch and chain Friday from Clint Montgomery, bartender in Alf Walker's saloon, had been caught in that city and for Mr Scott to come and get his prisoner. Accordingly he went down to Albany on the afternoon train and brought the man back to Eugene on the overland last night.

This morning at 10 o'clock the prisoner was taken before Justice of the Peace C. A. Wintermeier where he gave his name as Walter G. Maher. He voluntarily confessed that he stole the watch and chain, waived examination and was bound over to appear at the next term of circuit court in March. Not being able to give bonds he was placed in the county jail.

Maher was apprehended by descriptions sent out by the local police officers. He had been around town here the day before the theft, drawing pictures and as he was loitering around the saloon the morning the theft occurred, he was suspected of the crime. The watch and chain were found on his person when he was arrested.

Washington News.

WASHINGTON, Jan 13—The rumor of the intended resignation of Secretary Long has been revived. Ex-governor Crane, of Massachusetts, is likely to be appointed to the portfolio. Washington, Jan 13.—The Senate is considering the Nicaragua canal bill today.

Salem Wins Suit.

SALEM, Jan 13.—The supreme court has decided the Anson forfeiture bond suit in favor of this city.

DIED LAST NIGHT.—W. R. Elliott arrived in Eugene this morning from Blue River. He informed a reporter that Dave Belcher, who was severely injured at the Lucky Boy mine the other day, mention of which has already been made, is not expected to recover. Belcher was standing near a chute used to run down cordwood when a big stick flew out of the chute, striking him in the face. He did not seem to be badly injured at first but afterward became unconscious and was found in that condition by several employees of the mine. LATER.—A telephone message from J. W. Shumate, at Waltherville, late this afternoon, conveyed the information that word had just been brought there that Belcher died last night about 12 o'clock.

THE WOOLEN MILL.—H. D. Wagon, the woolen mill man, left Fremont, Neb., for Eugene, Jan 10 and is expected to be here tomorrow. Contractor Alley told us this morning that he thought he would have the building all completed this evening ready for the machinery.

THE BOHEMIA MINES

Secretary Hard Speaks of the Camp and the Railroad.

ACTIVE DEVELOPMENT WORK.

Secretary Hard, of the mining exchange, has returned from Cottage Grove and the Bohemia mining district says the Telegram. He covered 90 miles on horseback, making the principal properties in the camp, and what is unusual for this season of the year encountered no snow.

In speaking of the camp Mr Hard this morning said:

"There is more activity in the Bohemia mining district than ever there has been before, and if it gets the projected railroad from Cottage Grove there is no reason why Bohemia should not furnish a large share of Oregon's annual output of gold. Development work is being prosecuted with energy. At the Vesuvius the upraise recently made establishes the continuity of the oxidized ore body from the surface to the 350-foot level. The troubles of the Riverside property have been settled, the men paid off and development work resumed. Active development work is also being carried on at the Oregon-Colorado. The Helena mill is shut down, but underground work is still in progress."

Mr Hard brought some fine specimens of Oregon-Colorado ore back with him. Wednesday night he attended the mass meeting of citizens and property-owners held at Cottage Grove for the purpose of making some of the backward land-owners come to terms in the matter of granting rights of way for the projected Bohemia railroad. In reference to the meeting Mr Hard said:

"The meeting was harmonious and all present seemed to be anxious that every obstacle to the building of the road be removed. B. F. Morphy, the promoter of the road, represented that he had backing to the extent of \$500,000, and that the money was already put up. All present pledged their hearty support to the enterprise, and a committee was appointed to assist Mr Morphy to secure the rights of way still desired. If the promoters of the road have the money they say they have there is no reason why the Bohemia district should not have the railroad inside of a year."

NEW STORE AT SPRINGFIELD.—Miss Jennie Smithson, the young lady who had both legs cut off by a Southern Pacific train at Springfield several years ago and who recovered \$10,000 damages from the company, will start a new grocery store at Springfield in a few days. It will be located in the Walker blacksmith shop building.

FORMER EUGENE MAN.—Today's Oregonian: Chris Bartoch, of Dawson City, who is at the Imperial, is a large dealer in provisions in the Alaska metropolis, and it was from his firm that an abducting employe recently embezzled \$37,000, and succeeded in getting to Circle City on his way outside before being captured.
