A SUDDEN DEATH.

Mrs. Charles Harkness Died at Springfield Saturday Evening.

Mrs. Clara Harkness, of Walla Walla, who with her husband, had been visiting Mr Harkness' mother, Mrs T O Maxwell, at Springfield, died suddenly Saturday evening about 8 o'clock from heart trouble.

Mr and Mrs Harkness' children had been ill from scarlet fever, and Mrs Harkness contracted a cold while taking care of them, bringing on pneumonia. She was recovering nicely, however, when Saturday evening she was attacked by heart trouble and soon expired.

Mrs Harkness was aged 26 years. The remains were taken charge of by Undertaker Gordon and shipped from Eugene yesterday afternoon to Walla Walla for burial.
