Died.

Dr Arthur Ingram Nicklin died at
Good Samaritan hospital at Portland
this morning at 2 o'clock, after a short
illness. He leaves a widow and two
sons, Israel T, of Eugene, and Frank,
of Pendleton. The burial will take
place Monday at Salem. I T went to
Portland on this morning's early
train.Mr Nicklin, the deceased, was born
in Virginia, October 4, 1818; came to
Oregon in 1850; graduated from the
Willamette medical university in 1872;
in 1873 he removed to Eugene and was
engaged in active practice and was
also appointed United States exami-
ning surgeon, which position he filled
until 1882; he then became resident
physician of the Oregon Insane asylum,
East Portland, under the Hawthorne
administration; he acted as head phy-
sician, druggist and superintendent,
for about one year, until the patients
were taken in charge by the state, and
Dr Nicklin then removed them, num-
bering about 400, to Salem. In 1884
he returned to Portland and has since
continued in general practice; he was a
charter member of the Oregon state
medical society; he was a republican
most of his life, but voted for Bryan
