A DOSE OF PUBLIC OPINION.

President Roosevelt got a very strong reminder of how public opinion runs in regard to the Sampson-Schley naval controversy the other day. A correspondent of the Butte Miner tells the story:

It was somewhat embarrassing for the president the other night when he occupied a box at the National. Francis Wilson sang a song dedicated to Schley, in which he says:

"Perhaps he was not in command, but he fought to beat the band. And he ought to have a tablet in the hall of fame."

This produced tumultuous applause, and naturally all eyes were turned toward the box occupied by the Roosevelts, since the president had so recently taken action unfriendly to Schley. The incident brought the fact forcibly to the president's mind that Schley is intensely popular.

RAN ASHORE.

The Schooner Nettie Sundborg on the South Spit.

Florence West, Jan. 17.
Yesterday afternoon the schooner Nettie Sundborg, from San Francisco for the Sitka, sailed in across the bar and when some distance inside the breakers went ashore on the south spit. She soon began leaking badly, and the crew seeing that the craft was filling rapidly, went ashore in a small boat, taking the compass and their private property with them.

A crew of men were taken down from Florence last evening who put out anchors to prevent the boat from going further on the sand. They went back this morning and found the vessel resting on the bottom and nearly full of water. She lies a short distance below the end of the jetty.

The Nettie Sundborg is a small two-masted schooner and is owned by Julius Hyman, of San Francisco. She has been under charter to A. W. Beale & Co., who used her for carrying lumber. The vessel has no freight on board but is in ballast.
