terday.

A MINING SUIT.

Well Known Eugene People in the
Case.

Sunday's Oregonian: H L Hays, H
G Day, executors of the estate of J
G Day, Deceased; W T Coleman, J M
Abrams, E C Smith, S R Williams
and Ernest Miller, have filed suit in
the state circuit court against H W
Holden, W H Pool, Rodney Scott and
E J McLaughlin, to recover \$1776 and
\$326 on account of moneys borrowed
from the First National bank of Eu-
gene, for the benefit of the Myrtle
Creek Consolidated Gold Mining &
Milling Company. Ernest Miller takes
the place of William Miller, deceased,
as his heir. The loans were made in
1894, and amounted to a total of \$4370,
and when paid, to about \$5500. Beesle
Day was the holder of the judgments.

The parties were stockholders in
the mining company, and it is alleged
that it was agreed between them that
each should be liable in the ratio that
the number of the capital shares owned
by each bore to the entire number of
shares owned by all parties. The
plaintiffs aver that they together paid
all of the amount of the judgment, and
the defendants did not contribute any-
thing.

A CLERKS' UNION.

Eugene Grocery Clerks Talking
of Organizing.

A number of the grocery clerks of
the city have been seriously discussing
the last few days the matter of organ-
izing a clerks' union here.

The prime movers in the matter, we
understand, are in correspondence
with the officers of the union at Port-
land to learn how to proceed with the
organization here, and the proposition
will probably be taken up soon.

From one prominent clerk we learn
that if the union is formed it is the in-
tention to include all clerks in dry
goods and other stores as well as in the
groceries.

SCOURING MILL.—H D Wagner, of
the Willamette Valley Woollen Man-
ufacturing Co, today told a reporter
that the company intends to add a
wool-scouring mill to the plant when it
is finished. This is in addition to the
original plans of the company. The
scouring machine will be located un-
derneath the building. Workmen are
now excavating, making more room
underneath. The wool products will
be stored there also.

A LEAK IN THE BOILER.—This
morning after the engineer at the Eu-
gene Laundry had fired up for the day's
run he found the boiler of the engine
to be entirely empty of water and that
there was a bad leak. The boiler was
full of water yesterday and it is a
puzzle as to how the leak occurred.
Gross Bros, the foundrymen, are now
repairing the boiler, and operations at
the laundry which are now suspended
will be resumed soon.
