U. O. NOTES.

Dr. Beattie's Address at Assembly
This Morning.Dr. J. A. Beattie, president of the Wes-
ton normal school addressed the stu-
dents at assembly this morning. Dr.
Beattie is a very able speaker and his
address, which dealt with a very broad
and important subject, was very inter-
esting and well received. His subject
was, "The Need of Education in Our
Country." The speaker considered
the subject from the standpoint of the
need. Our civilization is maintained
by the home and school, the church
and Sunday school, the college and the
press. The home, church, Sunday
school and college have been losing
ground; the press advancing. With
this thought in mind, the speaker
made a plea for a more apprehensive
consideration of present conditions.
The need of education is indicated by
four conditions: First, by the size and
extent of the United States; second, by
the place we occupy as a nation; third,
by the great variety of our products,
industries, institutions, etc; fourth, by
the genius and nature of things which
make a government depend upon its
subjects. Dr. Beattie also pointed out
the need of purification in our great
American daily newspapers which far
outstrip those of any other nation.Dr. Beattie gave an address Tuesday
evening to the members of the educa-
tional seminar. The same subject was
taken, but it was treated from a differ-
ent standpoint, viz: that of the teacher.
His thoughts were centered around the
two factors of human destiny with
which the teachers have to do, namely,
formal instruction and environment.A practice game of indoor baseball
