STILL AN INDIAN.

The wisdom of giving Indian boys expensive education covering a period of several years at Carlisle and other Indian schools may be seriously questioned. The people in charge of Indian affairs seem to have serious doubts themselves, as is shown by a recent order requiring agents to see that returned students do not paint their faces, indulge in barbaric dances and feast and wear long hair like others of their people.

The government makes a mistake in taking these boys from their contented homes and trying to civilize them. After they are through with the training school, with all the high ideas sought to be inculcated, what remains for them? Can they associate with the whites? No! They must go back among the Indians, and there they must do as Indians do. The only difference is that the attempted education makes them a little more worthless than the Indians who are left alone.

There is something in man's makeup that is past finding out. For instance a young fellow of twenty who had been holding up farmers and others on a road leading out of Portland for a month or more, was arrested the other day. He had nerve enough to rob his victims at the muzzle of a pistol, but when placed in a bare, dark cell that splendid nerve failed him and he confessed to all his misdoings. At least to all he could remember, as there were about sixteen of them. Forgetfulness as to one or two might naturally be expected. That he got but about one hundred dollars from the two score of robberies is somewhat of a reflection on that prosperity the Oregonian tells about. Prosperity had not struck the highwayman's victims, at least.

There may be a rush to Cuba now that Neely, under arrest for postal peccolations down in the island, claims that the sixty thousand dollars found in his possession when arrested was handed him by a stranger. That stranger may still be there and stranger still, may be handing other thousand dollar packages about. But Neely will get no more of them. He will live a secluded life for twenty years, the guest of the United States in a penitentiary.

The Oregon Railway and Navigation Company railroad is not only one of the best paying properties in the country, tapping the rich wheat belts of Eastern Oregon and Washington as it does, but is also progressive. This year it will expend about a million dollars on track repairs and general betterments; and the contemplated expenditure is only in keeping with the policy of improvement that has been followed for the past four years.

That was a curious occurrence in a Pendleton school room, Wednesday, when a plastered ceiling fell to the desks as a whole, the strips to which the lath were nailed having pulled loose from the joint. Luckily warning was given by falling pieces of plaster in time to remove the children, else there might have been serious consequences, perhaps fatalities.

Judge Frazer of Portland is very liberal with years in his dealings with criminals convicted in his court. He has just given a colored young man seven years at Salem for complicity in the Hotel Port-

land ten thousand-dollar diamond robbery. And the same day the suburban road highwaymen who "held up" numerous travelers got ten and twenty years, respectively. One thing may be said of such sentences. The interested parties will not soon repeat their offenses, besides it may have a deterrent effect on others.

Abner McKinley, brother of the late President, is plaintiff in a suit against a railroad company for a six thousand dollar's attorney fee. He was associate counsel only, and rendered no particular service. Of course he was appointed merely because his brother was president. And if that brother had not been assassinated the bill would have been paid without question.
