ELECTED TO CHAIR.

Prof Washburn Will Receive
\$2 400 Per Year Instead of
\$2,000 as Now.

ST PAUL, Jan 23.—The State Board
of Regents of the University of Minne-
sota today elected Professor F L Wash-
burn, of the Oregon State University,
to succeed the late Otto Lagger as
state entomologist.

Professor F L Washburn, whose
resignation from the chair of biology
has been accepted by the Board of
Regents, to take effect February 7, and
who has been elected state entomologist
in the University of Minnesota, will
receive a salary of \$2,400 a year,
and the Legislature appropriates an-
nually \$5000 to be expended in research
work. The work in the University
of Minnesota requires a minimum
amount of teaching, practically all the
time being given to research work.
Professor Washburn has been identifi-
ed with the University of Oregon for
the past seven years, his work being in
the department of biology, which also
included a pre-medical course for ad-
vanced students. In 1899 he was ap-
pointed to the State University. Pro-
fessor Washburn was for six years
entomologist at the state experiment
station at Corvallis. He is a graduate
of Harvard University, and is 41 years
of age.

High School Tuition Fee Sug-
gested.

EUGENE, Jan 24, 1902.

ED GUARD:—As means are being
suggested for raising additional funds
to support the High School, why
would not a reasonable tuition fee from
the pupils who attend the same be ap-
propriate? Students who come from
outside districts pay tuition for the
High School, and why should not
those who live in the city? Moreover,
students in the University pay a tu-
ition of \$10. Those who go to the High
School are a comparatively small pro-
portion of those of school age, and
why should all the people be com-
pelled to pay for their High School
courses?

The public schools are attended by
all, are necessary to all, hence are sup-
ported entirely by public taxation, but
few, comparatively, are able or have
the time to attain a higher education
and so it is only just and fair that they
should pay tuition.

A fee of \$10 or such sum as the board
of directors could easily determine
from the annual expense of the school,
would obviate the necessity of borrow-
ing money or raising the rate of taxa-
tion, and not be burdensome to fam-
ilies or students.
