PATTERSON SCHOOL.

February 10, 1901, a special meeting of the voters of School District No. 4 was held for the purpose of discussing the matter of the creation of a new building in the eastern part of the district and the purpose of remitting the repairs of Central and Geary buildings and refunding the \$4,000 indebtedness.

On motion the board of directors was authorized to call a legal voters of the district No. 4 at the school meeting to be held on Monday in March (being the 11th day of March, 1901), the question of bonding the district for \$25,000 for the purpose above mentioned. And at said election, bonds carried by a large majority, and the directors proceeded to advertise for plans for a new school building, and after due deliberation adopted the plans of Chas. H. Burggraf, architect.

Bonds were issued and dated July 1, 1901, to run twenty years with option of the district to redeem at any time after ten years, at 4 per cent interest, payable semi-annually. Said bonds sold at par, district receiving \$25,000 for same and expended the money in the following manner:

CONCLUSIONS.

The population of Eugene is increasing rapidly and our facilities are inadequate for the increase. Nearly every room is now full to overflowing but one room vacant, and that in Central. We provide for seating it and also provide for three more teachers, and it is quite evident to your present board that they will be needed, and that you will be renting rooms for school purposes before another year passes. More room is an evident fact and needs the serious consideration of the taxpayers and to prepare for action not later than a year from this time.

We have tried to be economical in all our expenditures and the board will be very economical, and saving, if they make these estimates carry them through.

A few years ago this county received from the state \$40,000 annually for school purposes. Last year this county received only \$25,000. Here is a great saving of \$15,000 and I cannot account for it but in the reduction of the rate of interest from 8 to 6 per cent.

We have \$1000 extra as interest on bonds to provide for yearly, nearly one mile on present assessment.

We recommend that a 6-mill tax be levied upon the assessable property of school district No. 4, Lane county, Oregon, for school purposes.
