J. K. Sturtevant.

J K Sturtevant, a well known and highly respected old-time citizen of Crow, Lane county, died at his home Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock from paralysis.

Mr Sturtevant came across the plains to Oregon in an early day, settling in Lane county on the place where he died. He has met with prosperity during his residence in the county and has accumulated a good sized fortune.

The deceased gentleman fought in the Indian wars in the early days and was shot through the abdomen in an engagement with the savages. He was 71 years old. He leaves a wife and family of several children to mourn his demise. The funeral will be held tomorrow and the remains will be interred in the Stephens cemetery at Crow.
