Died.

Mrs. S. J. Bonnett died at the family residence in Eugene, from jaundice, at 10 o'clock last night. The funeral will be held at the Christian church tomorrow forenoon at 11 o'clock, Rev E C Sanderson, dean of the Divinity School, conducting the services. Interment in I O O F cemetery.

Annis (Parsons) Bonnett was born October 1st, 1822, in Randolph county, Virginia, now West Virginia. Moved with her parents to Iowa in 1838. Was married to Samuel J Bonnet Nov 26, 1840. Emigrated to Oregon in 1854, arriving at Eugene September 18th of that year. At that time Alfred, the oldest son was a lad of 18 years while the youngest, Perry, was but 15 months old. This pioneer woman drove a team the greater part of the way across the plains. Among the party were the Veach's, of Cottage Grove, the Rhinehart's and the late Thomas Edwards.

The Bonnetts were the sixth family to reside in Eugene. Later they moved to a claim on the McKenzie river near the Spore bridge, residing there till 1883 when they moved to Eugene. She united with the Christian church in 1842. Her husband survives her together with nine children: Alfred, Marion, Perry and Albert, and Mrs S B Thomas, all residing in Eugene; Charles and Marcellus, of Burns, Harney county, and Mrs R P Dey and Mrs Morris J Brown, of Oakland, California.
