KLEMM BUILDING.

J. H. Klemm's Eighth Street
Brick to Be Doubled in
Size.

A TWO-STORY 26X60 ADDITION.

The GUARD has before made exclusive mention of a big addition to be built by John H. Klemm to his brick building on West Eighth street, occupied by his harness shop.

When asked about the matter by a reporter this afternoon Mr Klemm stated that the new building when completed will make a building just double the size of the present one which is two stories high and 26x60 feet in dimensions. The addition will be built on the rear of the building, extending north toward the Chambers warehouse.

No contract has yet been let for the erection of the big addition but will probably be soon, and work will immediately thereafter be commenced. The brick to be used has already been engaged for by J. M. Martin.

Mr Klemm says his new addition will be very substantially built, using the best material in its construction.
