A TRUE PACIFIC COAST FRIEND

President Gompers of the Ameri can Federation of Labor was before the House committee of Foreign Affairs, Monday, to protest against any modification of the Chinese exclusion law.

In the course of his remarks Mr Gompers said it was the duplicity of the Chinese laborer who sought to gain admission by assuming to be in the exempt class that caused the necessity for stringent exclusion laws. To the argument that had been advanced that American workmen would have to meet Euro pean and Chinese standards of cheap living, Mr Gompers an swered that if long hours and low wages meant industrial superiority, then China would have been at the head of the industrial nations of the world long ago.

The Pacific Coast owes Mr Gompers a debt of gratitude for his protest against any further invasion of a demoralizing labor element. He will be listened to for he is more than plain Mr Gompers. The congressmen and senators who would be only too glad to put down the exclusion bars if their personal popularity should not be involved by so doing, will think twice before antagonizing a labor organization that controls many thousands of votes.

A CHRISTIAN SCIENTISM DEM ONSTRATION.

The death of a Michigan man, a believer in the Christian Scien tist faith cure, Saturday, was made the subject of official inquiry by a coroner's jury. The verdict is anything but complimentary to the people who affect to believe that they can cure themselves of physical disorders through mere belief and exercise of will power. Here is the verdict rendered by the Michigan jury, a scathing indictment:

We find deceased came to his death as a result of a complication of diseases, most acute in form and character, and that his end was un timely and most miserable, owing to his being denied the medical supervision and treatment which was necessary. We find inhuman treatment accorded said deceased by a so-called sect of Christian Scien tists, in disregard of all basic and physiological laws.

A Dawson undertaking establish ment holds a strange security in the shape of a coffin body. Charles W. Watts, a former Albany, Oregon, newspaper man, died in Dawson twenty-two months ago. The body was embalmed for ship ment but the undertaker refused to part with possession until his charges were paid. Watts' friends deemed the bill excessive and there the matter rests. It does seem that poor mortality is entitled to decent sepulture, to a title to the two by six feet of earth that in the end re mains the sole possession of man kind, of whatever station.

The Chicago council having come to the conclusion that the earth's shell is of sufficient thickness to sustain the contemplated sky-scrapers, at least two of them will be built as soon as possible. That they are genuine sky-scrapers will not be doubted, considering the price, \$21,338,000 for the two. That is about one-half what the City of Portland is assessed for.

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Notice to Tax Payers—New Tax Law.

At the last session of the legislature a new law was passed in regard to the collection of taxes, which law took ef fect on December 1st, 1901, and in sub stance is as follows:

1. If you pay your taxes on or be fore March 15th you will be allowed a re late of three per cent.

2. If you pay your taxes between March 15th and up to and including the first Monday in April there will not be any penalty or interest added.

3. If your taxes are not paid on or before the first Monday of April, they will become delinquent, when there will be added a penalty of 10 per cent, and the tax will also draw interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum in addition to the penalty.

4. If you pay one-half of your taxes on or before the first Monday in April then the remaining half may run up to and including the first Monday in October following; but if the last half of tax due is not paid by the first Mon day of October, it becomes delinquent, and there will be added to such balance, a penalty of 10 per cent, and in addi tion, such balance will bear interest at the rate of 12 per cent per annum from the first Monday in April until paid.

5. On all personal property taxes if one-half is not paid on or before the first Monday in April, the law com pels the sheriff to levy upon and col lect the same after May 1st, hence to prevent a levy upon personal property after May 1st it will be necessary for one-half to be paid as above stated.

6. The law compels the sheriff to sell all lands on which taxes have not been paid, and such sales shall not be held later than March 1st of the year succeeding the year in which the tax levy is made.

7. The property will be sold to the person bidding the lowest rate of in terest, and certificates will be issued therefor, and deeds given to such prop erty sold, unless redeemed within three years from the date of such sale.

The 1901 assessment rolls will be re ceived at the sheriff's office March 1st, 1902. Any written enquiries regarding 1901 taxes resolved prior to that date will be filed and promptly attended to as soon as the books are open for pay ment. In making enquiries as to amount of taxes, if possible, give to whom the property is assessed and a description of the same.
