WILL TEACH IN CALIFORNIA.

Dr. Lachman Received an Offer From President Wheeler.

Dr. Arthur Lachman, head of the department of chemistry at the University, has received an offer from President Benjamin I. Wheeler, of the University of California at Berkeley in regard to teaching during the summer school at that place. The school is of six weeks duration and the professor will receive \$250 for his services. His work will be in the line of courses.

Dr. Lachman's name as a chemist is well known and appreciated all along this coast. He is said to be the peer of any teacher of the three states, in chemistry. Both Dr. Lachman and the California institution are to be congratulated upon the arrangement.
