Eliza Isabel Edwards, wife of County Commissioner Henry D Edwards, died Feb 12, 1902, at the family home 4 1/2 miles east of Springfield, from consumption.

Mrs Edwards was aged 51 years and 19 days and was the mother of several children. She leaves a large circle of friends who, with her husband and children, mourn her demise.

The funeral will be held tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock at the residence and will be conducted by Rev J T Merrill, pastor of the United Brethren church of this city. The remains will be interred in the Eugene I O O F cemetery.

Frank C Baker, former state printer, who recently brought suit for divorce from his wife, Kate Baker, has had the papers withdrawn and will not push the case. It is stated that Mrs Baker has promised to reform, and that they will live together as husband and wife. The divorce was based on the ground of gross intemperance.

ANOTHER FREIGHT WRECK.

Five Cars Ditched Again Near Alca Station.

Another small freight train wreck occurred one mile east of Alca, a small station 28 miles south of Eugene, about 9 o'clock this morning. Five cars of southbound extra freight train No 221 were derailed at that point and regular trains are delayed in consequence.

The passenger trains will transfer passengers, baggage, mail, etc, at the scene of the wreck and the southbound train which passed through here at 2:08 will turn around and come back, arriving here about 6 o'clock this evening. The northbound will also turn around and proceed back toward Prine.

It seems there is a hoodoo hovering over that locality or else the track is in very bad shape. This is the third small wreck that has occurred in that vicinity within the last two weeks.

A BOLD HOLDUP.

Orman Miller Held Up By a
Lone Highwayman.

NOT THE WRONG MAN.

JUNCTION CITY, Or, Feb 13.—A lone highwayman held up Orman Miller last night about 8 o'clock on the Taylor bridge crossing the Long Tom. As Miller rode into the covered bridge he saw a man on a large black horse standing inside. When within about 10 feet of the man he was ordered to put up his hands which he did gracefully. He was told to hand over his money. Miller told him he had no money but he would give him his watch. The robber said he did not want his watch and then made him get off his horse and walk to the open end of the bridge and out into the road which was covered by water about knee deep.

The robber then could see him plainly and said: "Young man, you are not the fellow I am looking for. Come back and get on your horse and get for home."

This being the only pleasant order given to the boy, he lost no time in obeying it. Miller could give no description of the man other than that he was on a large black horse and was a tall man with a heavy mustache and had a saddle on his horse such as used by stockmen.

VEIN OF COAL SHALE

The Oil Drill Encounters It
at 60 Feet.

OIL INDICATIONS GOOD.

J E Simmons, the oil and coal promoter, returned to Portland this afternoon to spend some time at home to recuperate, his health not being the best at this time.

Mr Simmons this forenoon informed a GUARD reporter that yesterday afternoon the Great West company's oil drilling plant at Springfield encountered a vein of coal shale at a depth of 80 feet which was 6 feet through, and the drill went through the vein in 45 minutes. Just before the vein was encountered the drill was going through blue slate and has been in that formation since going through the coal shale and by this evening a depth of at least 80 feet will have been reached.

The reporter was shown a lot of small particles of the shale brought up by the drill and it had the appearance of being of splendid quality.

Mr Simmons says the indications of oil are growing better and better as the drilling progresses, and is confident of finding it in large quantities. The shale shown the reporter had an oily appearance, indicating petroleum seepages.

In speaking of the Cascade Coal Co's mine at Creswell Mr Simmons said that a large force of men is at work on the shaft and tunnel and several men were prospecting on nearby lands which the company now controls.

NATIONAL PARK'S NEW GEYSER

Gigantic Column of Seething, Surging, Hot Water Makes Earth Quiver.

BUTTE, Montana, Feb 12.—A special to the Miner gives further particulars of the breaking out of the new geyser in the Yellowstone National Park. Soldiers yesterday carried news to Mammoth Hot Springs of a rumbling resembling distant thunder, a quivering of the earth as though by an earthquake, and the mighty leaping of a gigantic column of seething, surging, hot water high in the air.

The new geyser is situated in the vicinity of Norris Basin, high up in the timber, about 45 yards from the Constant geyser. The geyser, which has been named "The Twentieth Century," plays in a manner similar to the Constant, but of many times greater volume. It also erupts more frequently than the Constant, spouting at intervals of one and a quarter to two hours.
