DR. C. F. CANDIANI. Blue River Mine Owner Appointed Italian Consular Agent at Portland.

PORTLAND, Feb 21.—Dr C F Candiani, of this city, has been appointed royal consular agent at Portland for the Italian government. Cavaliere F Sona, royal Italian consul-general, with headquarters at San Francisco, has notified by letter, Cavaliere Dr C F Candiani, of this city, that the royal ministry of foreign affairs of Italy, by royal decree, has established a royal consular agency for Italy in Portland, and authorized the appointment of Cavaliere Dr Candiani to the post. The "ex-quo" is expected to arrive from the federal government at Washington within a few days.

Dr Candiani, who has resided in and about Portland for the past 27 years is well known in Eugene as an extensive owner of mining properties in the Blue River district and has many friends here who are glad to hear of his appointment and extend congratulations. The new appointee descends from one of Italy's oldest noble families. Dr Candiani is a son of John Candiani, count of Olivola and marquis of Castelleborgo, who married the Countess Bongiovanni. The doctor having an elder brother, is therefore cavaliere of Olivola and count of Castelleborgo. Having graduated from the royal college of physicians and surgeons, at Naples, and the medical schools of Paris, Dr Candiani entered the army. He served as sergent of the Grenadiers of the Guards, and fought in that position through eight years of the wars for the independence of Italy. He received two wounds at the battle of Custoga.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

"Doc" Anders Killed at Springfield This Afternoon.

WAS WORKING IN THE SAWMILL. A telephone message from Springfield to the GUARD this afternoon at 1:45 o'clock conveyed the intelligence of a terrible accident which occurred at the Booth-Kelly Company's sawmill at that place at 1:30 o'clock. E S Anders, familiarly known as "Dook", Anders, was at work on the log way at the mill drawing logs up from the water. It seems that the "dog" had not been driven into one of the logs securely and flying out, struck the man on the left temple with such force as to shatter the skull, scattering the brains in every direction. He lived only a few minutes after the accident.

Immediately after the accident happened Dr R G Van Valkah, of Springfield, was sent for, but for some reason he refused to go. His action in the matter was very unprofessional to say the least. Dr W Kuykendall, of this city, was then telephoned for and he left immediately, but arrived after death had come. Undertaker J W Kays was also sent for and he left here about 2:30 o'clock to take charge of the remains and prepare them for burial.

Mr Anders was a well known and highly respected citizen of Springfield and was aged about 45 years. He was a former councilman of that city, was an Odd Fellow and belonged to Springfield camp, Woodmen of the World. He leaves a wife and four children—three boys and one girl. His wife is nearly prostrated by the shock and the family has the sympathy of all in their sudden bereavement. No arrangements have as yet been made for the funeral.

A FAMILY POISONED. Ate Canned Tomatoes and One Child is in a Critical Condition.

Dr L W Brown returned this morning from Cottage Grove where he was called to consult with Dr Schiefel, of that city, in a case of poisoning there. Last Saturday the family of Roy Coffman ate canned tomatoes for supper. About midnight the oldest daughter, seven years old, became very ill. She suffered from a severe headache and vomited freely. The next day the three other children were taken ill and Dr Schiefel was sent for. The parents who also ate the tomatoes were not effected by the poison. While the three youngest children are getting better and will recover, the seven-year-old daughter is in a critical condition and there is but little hope for her recovery. The physicians state that the poison was caused by the acid in the tomatoes acting on the tin.

Stole Hundreds of Thousands. Special to the Guard. DETROIT, Feb 21.—A further shortage of \$600,000 has been found in the investigation of the affairs of the First National bank in addition to the large sums heretofore discovered, due to speculations of Cashier Andrews. The money was lost in stock and produce exchange speculations. Additional warrants have been issued for Andrews who is already in jail.
