Gilstrap on temporary and permanent location.

The matter of choosing a name for the club was then referred to a committee which recommended the name of "Eugene Commercial Club." The recommendation was unanimously adopted.

The club starts out under auspicious conditions and there is a bright future before it. Great good will be done our progressive city by such an organization.
