ELECTRIC STORM UP NORTH

Sky a Glare of Lightning an Hour at Mouth of Puget Sound

TEXAS SWEEP BY STORMS

FORT WORTH, March 13.—Heavy storms have swept the western part of Texas for the last three days.

So far six deaths have been reported of persons caught out on the prairies. It is feared that many more have perished.

ST PETERSBURG, March 13.—The Russian novelist, Count Tolstoi has suddenly become much worse. It is thought that his death is a question of but a few hours.

THE FREIGHT HANDLER'S STRIKE.

BOSTON, March 13.—The strike of the railroad freight-handlers and kindred branches of labor is still spreading till there are at least 20,000 men out of employment. Several thousand of that number are not strikers but are cut out of work by dependence on striking branches of labor. The men directly reached by the strike include freight-handlers, teamsters, longshoremen, wood-handlers and railway switchmen.

Secretary Easley of the Civic Federation of Labor is here. A conference set for this afternoon will attempt to settle the strike.

WARFARE IN MANCHURIA.

ST PETERSBURG, March 13.—A big fight is reported between the Russian army of occupation in Manchuria and rebellious Tugluses.

The Russians defeated the natives, killing two hundred and capturing three guns.

SOME DEMOCRATIC PARTY POLITICS.

WASHINGTON, March 13.—The Cleveland wing of the Democratic party is quietly working out a scheme of politics having for its object the elimination of Bryan and the silver issue from Democratic councils.

It is proposed that the appeal to the people shall be made on the tariff and trusts and the Philippine question. Senator Gorman of Maryland is favored for the leader by senators and congressmen who are in touch with the movement.

TIMBER FRAUDS.

Flagrant Violations of the Law
Found in Lane County.

TROUBLE WILL ENSUE.

Alex Crawford and H E Staples government timber-land inspectors, returned to Eugene last night from the Lake Creek country, out in the western part of the county, where they went several days ago to look into alleged frauds in connection with the government timber-land business.

The gentlemen report that they have found flagrant violations of the law. They state that they found 37 claims in that vicinity which have been sold or contracted for before being proven up on.

They say that they intend to make examples of the offenders in these cases and no doubt trouble will ensue in a short time.

STORE IMPROVEMENTS.—F E Dunn today commenced quite extensive improvements in the interior of his big store. Glass counters and glass hat cases will be installed, new shelving put in and a general rearrangement will be made. When the improvements are completed Mr Dunn will have much more room in the store.

SENTENCE COMMUTED.

Claud McHargue, Sent to the Penitentiary From Lane, Goes Home to Die.

Albany Democrat: "James McHargue, of this city, returned from Salem this week with his son Claud, sentenced three years ago to the penitentiary for forgery committed in Lane county. His sentence was commuted by the governor on the grounds of consumption, he having been in the hospital for several months. He went to Salem March 17, 1899, on a four years' sentence. He is now at his father's in this city and will be taken care of until his death, which can be only a few months away."

McHargue was sentenced to the penitentiary for passing a fraudulent check on Burkholder & Hemenway, of Cottage Grove, for the sum of \$49.50, signed "A K Patterson," and on the First National Bank of Eugene. He was indicted March 8, 1899, and sentenced to four years on March 11.

Organized Murderers.

Beaumont, Texas, March 12.—It is the theory of the police that an organized band of negro women and white men are responsible for the recent murders after robbery here, and the sheriff is making arrests on that theory. He now has a woman in the "dead box" whom he believes to be the ringleader and believes that she will shortly confess.

HUGHES NOT LOST.

Went to His Claim Six Miles
From Coburg.

FOUND IN HIS CABIN.

The people of Coburg were somewhat worked up yesterday over what they supposed to be the disappearance of Joseph Hughes, a resident of that place and formerly of Wendling. The report was circulated that he had become demented by illness and that he had told someone that he was going out to the mountains to die.

He went to the mountains, but not to die. He was found to be very much alive in a cabin on his claim about six miles from Coburg some time before noon today by a party of men who had gone out to look for him. Mr Hughes had no intention of killing himself and it is probable that he is still in his right mind. He was naturally surprised to learn that he was expected to be found dead.

THREE CENTS A MILE.

An Effort Will Be Made to Reduce
the S. P. Passenger Rate.

The GUARD has received a marked copy of the Portland Chronicle with the following:

There is no reason why the people who are forced to ride over the Southern Pacific railroad should pay 4 cents a mile. The Southern Pacific Company can carry passengers cheaper from points where they have competition. Take Oregon City for instance. You can ride that 18 miles on the S P for 25 cents. That is 1½ cents per mile.

Between New Era and Portland is a distance of 22 miles and a fare of 46 cents, about 2 cents a mile. At one time they made a rate of 25 cents between Newberg and Portland, a distance of 24 miles. All of which shows that 4 cents a mile is exorbitant and that the trains of the company can be operated at a profit for less. In view of the fact that other railroads only charge 3 cents, and that the S P Co can operate its trains for less, it is evident that the next legislature should make a legal rate of 3 cents a mile, and compel the S P Co to carry passengers for that price. Elect no one to the legislature unless he be pledged to a 3 cent a mile fare.

The Southern Pacific Company is the most greedy and rapacious monopoly on the Pacific coast, and everyone knows it. Its general passenger agent, Mr R B Miller, is taking a hand in politics, and hopes to have a legislature elected that will not interfere with the graft. Let the voters see to it that every candidate for which they vote is pledged to make a legal 3 cents a mile fare.

The O R & N, Northern Pacific and A & C railroads all carry passengers at 3 cents a mile or less, while the S P continues to charge 4 cents, and that with a large travel, cheaper equipment and poorer roadbed than either of the other roads.

Murder in the Mountains.

BURNS, March 12.—Particulars have reached here of the killing, on March 7th, of George Simpson by Pat Moore, which was one of the most cold-blooded murders ever committed within the borders of Harney county. The affair occurred in Alvord valley, in the southern part of the county, about 150 miles from Burns.
