A REMARKABLE OLD MAN.

George H. Williams, President Grant's attorney-general from 1871 to 1875, is the Republican nominee for mayor of Portland. He is a remarkable man. At 79 years, an age at which with very few exceptions the survivors are weak not only in body but mind, he retains his full mental vigor, giving daily attention to a large law practice.

Still there would be chances to take in electing a man of that age to a two-year term of office. The young may die, but the old must die.

NEVADA'S NEW MINES.

They have found two new mining camps to hold public attention—Thunder Mountain, Idaho, and Tonopah, Nevada. A late report from the newly discovered Nevada mineral district says:

Tonopah, which is the center of the new mining district, is located sixty-five miles from Sodaville, Nye county, Nevada, and is reached by stage. At the present time it has a population of about 1,500. It is a typical frontier town, where lumber is quoted at \$1 per board for building material and provisions and living proportionately high. Water, which is hauled four miles into camp, sells at \$1.50 per barrel and 25 cents per bucket. Miners and prospectors are flowing into it by the scores, and rich discoveries are being reported daily.

Nye is the middle county of the south tier of three. It is 140 by 175 miles of hills and desert, with about 1200 population before this mining excitement.

RHODES' PUBLIC SPIRIT.

Speculation is rife in English circles as to how Cecil Rhodes has disposed of his immense fortune. It seems to be the general opinion that the hundreds of millions have been left as a public trust to South Africa. A London dispatch says:

Those intimate with Mr Hawkeley, who drew Mr Rhodes' will, are confident that the mining and other investments have been pooled and left entire as a trust for the benefit of South Africa. Those closely associated with Mr Rhodes do not expect special bequests. They assert that it was one of Mr Rhodes' cardinal principles that personal service should be well recompensed during his life and that the bulk of his fortune should be reserved for public purposes in South Africa.

That Wyoming mob was right. The cold-blooded murderer of the sheriff who sought to arrest him had a fair trial and was convicted according to law. But when the state supreme court granted a stay of execution the people knew there was a chance in the delays of the law for him to escape the penalty pronounced against those who shed men's blood. Then they hung him. In such a case it makes no difference who hangs the criminal—the mob or the sheriff.

If there was some way by which that Jeffree-Fitzsimmons prizefight could be brought off at once and the contestants made to beat each other to death the reading public would be supremely happy. Why the Associated Press should burden their report day after day with such stuff is incomprehensible. We do not believe the reading public demands it.

We have been feeling that way for a time and are relieved on learning the cause. The chairman of the Bank of Africa, London, says the world is short two hundred million dollars through the closing of the South African mines during the two and a half years of the Boer war.

Of course we all know that London is a good big town, but it sets one to thinking on seeing the statement that the city increases fifty thousand a year. Enough to make a good-sized city of themselves—nearly three times the population of Lane county.
