VETERANS AND SOLDIERS.

"A Cranky Veteran" Has His Say About G. A. R. and U. V. U. Matters.

EUGENE, March 31.

EDITOR GUARD:—A recent issue of the Register scored the members of the Union Veteran's Union for the vote of certain of the members two years ago. I wish to correct any wrong impression that may have been placed in the public mind regarding the Grand Army and Union Veteran's Union and politics.

The Grand Army of the Republic has no politics. We are made up of veterans who served six months or longer in any regiment that was mustered into the army or navy from 1861 to 1865, in any capacity. The Union Veteran's Union does not allow any soldier to become a member unless he served in one or more battles and has a clean record from the war department. Some soldiers belong to both organizations while others belong to neither. Both have very strong obligations for their members, but they don't always live up to them, especially if self comes in the way. The members of the Union Veteran's Union mostly served two years and recruited for three more. Their duty is first to the U V U, to any other soldier, then to soldier's friends irrespective of party. They have republican members, and would you believe it, populists, and, horrible to relate, democrats! There are also a few floppers.

A number of years ago Senator Mitchell and the then congressman, Binger Herman, gave the soldiers the privilege of naming the postmaster for Eugene. At that time the U V U was organized, with Dr Russell of Thurston as the first colonel. They named a candidate, but some of the G A R did not like it and named another. When the soldiers failed to agree the place was given to a woman—and the women are the best friends of the soldiers. Then the G A R passed resolutions censuring Senator Mitchell and Congressman Herman.

Four years ago the democrats nominated a soldier for representative, and he was elected. Two years ago the name of Frank Kelaner was voted on in the U V U and sent to the republican convention, but he was ignored and another soldier given the office. The U V U and the man we recommended were thus publicly insulted. Our democratic friends showed their appreciation of the old soldier by making Comrade Sherman janitor of the courthouse.

President Roosevelt says all things being equal the soldier should have the preference. The battle-scarred veterans that have done the work are the best judges and will stand by their choice and live up to their principles, win or fail. It makes no difference if a man of doubtful proclivities forgets to nominate our candidate after promising to do so. We will stay with our principles whether or not we are sold out. Boys do your duty!

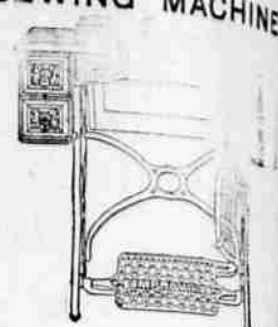

CECIL RHODES' GRAVE.

He Designated Matopopo Hill—A Noble Monument Will Mark the Spot.

NEW YORK, March 31.—Gardner Williams, manager of the De Beers mines, has left London for South Africa, says a London dispatch to the Tribune. He says he will arrive in time to attend the last stage of the funeral of Cecil Rhodes. A special road has to be cut to the spot on Matopopo Hill, which Mr Rhodes designated as his final resting place. At present this place can only be reached by a difficult bridle path. Mr Williams says the burial will not take place for about a month. The grave will be marked by a noble monument, to be erected by the dead statesman's personal friends and business colleagues.

It is proposed that the gun-carriage which bore "Long Cecil" during the siege of Kimberly, and which will convey the body up the steep side of Matopopo, shall be stationed on the summit of the hill as part of memorial.
