COLD WATER FOR FURNISH ALREADY.

Two years ago the Republican candidates for Oregon congressmen together had over twelve thousand votes plurality. In face of that vote the Portland Telegram on the very afternoon of the nomination of Mr. Furnish as the Republican candidate for governor gave that gentleman a very good dash of cold water—ice water as it were—even used the very indelicate "if" in referring to his prospect of election:

"Mr. Furnish, if elected, will make a careful, capable Governor. But he will not have such a walk over next June as some Republican nominees have had heretofore."

Candidate Furnish undoubtedly felt a chilly sensation in the region of the backbone when he read that, and then remembered that the big part of the nearly ten thousand majority of the Eastern Oregon district for the Republican candidate for congress came from Portland, also that his competitor to be, Mr. Chamberlain, carried Portland for prosecuting attorney by several thousand majority at that same election. Mr. Furnish has reason to feel chilly when he consults those Multnomah county election returns.

A GRASS TRUST BEAT MOODY.

Congressman Malcolm Moody has found out what it means to publicly work for corporate interests—that is when his horse people are the ones hit hard. He has been retired from the Portland and Eastern Oregon congressional district simply because his vote and influence were thrown in favor of monopoly, of leasing the public range to large corporations to the practical exclusion of small stockmen. He made the mistake in supposing that the party record for trusts would carry him through with his constituents. But those constituents kicked over the traces when a practical illustration of trust legislation came directly home to them. And the district that gave Moody nearly ten thousand majority in a vote of less than thirty-five thousand two years ago repudiated him.

It was all right for Moody to vote for trusts on clothing, machinery, sugar, in fact about all the necessities of life, but it was all wrong for him to vote for an Eastern Oregon grass trust. He has found it out too late.

WILL HISTORY REPEAT ITSELF

Will Oregon political history repeat itself? Sylvester Penoyer, an attorney by profession, though not in practice at the time of his election, defeated David P. Thompson, banker, the Republican candidate in 1890.

George E. Chamberlain, prosecuting attorney of Multnomah county, is the Democratic candidate against William J. Furnish, a Pendleton banker, on the Republican ticket. Chamberlain has never failed to overcome odds when nominated and, we believe, is very liable to do business for Oregon as her governor.

Rural free delivery is meeting with success in Oregon, twenty-eight routes being in operation. In farming communities one hundred families can be served on a twenty-five mile route, and they are entitled to the daily delivery of mail, six days in the week. The system practically brings the country sections into the metropolitan system of daily letter carriers, and the farmer can

have his daily paper left at his gate within a few hours after it has been printed. Each resident along the route must have a mail box left ready, as the carriers cannot alight from their carts to receive or deliver mail.

An international union, with ten thousand members, has accepted a woman as a member for the first time. It may not be the last time. Miss Maud Dennison, of Chicago, will be made a member of the United Brotherhood of Leather Workers and Horse Goods Employees. She is an A. I. mechanic and can hold her own with any man in the country as a harness-maker.

While Lane county got no place on the Republican state ticket she has two native sons—Judge Bean for supreme judge and Joel R. Whitney for state printer.

AN EXPRESS PACKAGE.

Why the Shipper Would Not Designate Its Value.

"What is the value?" asked an express agent in a Broadway office of a keen-eyed customer who had handed him a package to be sent to a western city. The man addressed did not answer at once, but glanced at a printed card on the wall that reads, "Always state the value of your shipment."

"If I state the value, will your company pay me that amount in case the package is lost?" asked the man in his turn.

"Certainly not, unless that is proved to be the value," answered the agent.

"If I state the value, can I prove a greater value if it is lost?"

"You will have to ask a lawyer that question," replied the agent.

"That isn't necessary, for I happen to know the law," said the shipper. "Your company is trying to establish an unfair rule, because it works only one way. You are right when you say that my statement cannot bind you, for in case of loss you can prove the value, but my statement would bind me, for the court would say that I was 'estopped' by my declaration as to the value."

"If a shipper should undervalue his shipment, thinking that thereby he would reduce the charges, he would have to stand by his statement, and your notice is calculated to make him do that very thing. You can mark my shipment 'No value stated,' and then if we meet in the courts it will be on an equal footing."—New York Herald.

The Miles We Walk.

How many miles a man walks in his lifetime depends naturally upon how much he walks a day on the average, but the man who walks the least covers a vast number of miles before he dies. Some men walk two miles a day, some four or five and some as many as ten. If a man walks two miles a day and lives to be thirty years old, he will cover 21,900 miles. At the same age a man who walks three miles a day will have walked 32,850 miles. Almost every man walks between two and three miles a day. Just in going about the house, the office, the shop and in going to and from the cars, etc.

A man who walks five miles a day finds that at the age of thirty he has covered 54,750 miles and at the age of sixty 109,500. From this should, strictly speaking, be subtracted the few months or a year when he was a baby unable to walk, but the result would not be affected materially.

Now, the circumference of the earth at the equator is only 24,900 miles, so therefore a man who at the age of sixty has averaged five miles a day since he was able to walk has walked enough miles to have encircled the earth four times and have a good many miles left over toward the fifth lap.
