Saturday was pay-day for the teachers in the Eugene public schools. Clerk Crow distributed about \$1200 among the 22 teachers and to Superintendent Bechdolt.

At the democratic primaries at Florence A E Pickle was nominated for Justices of the peace, Wm Bernhardt for constable and John C Beck for supervisor.
