CITY COUNCIL.

East Eleventh Street Will Be Beautified.

OTHER MATTERS.

At a special meeting of the city council last night a petition signed by property owners on East Eleventh street and headed by Prof. John Straub was presented asking that the privilege of putting in a curb five feet from the sidewalks on both sides of East Eleventh street from Willamette street to the University. The petition was granted. The purpose of this curbing is to plant flowers and shrubs, and if this is done the entire distance specified in the petition, East Eleventh will be the most beautiful street in any city in Oregon. This is a commendable move and no property owner on that street should neglect to improve the street in front of his property in such manner.
Other matters attended to by the council were as follows:
Councilman Barker was appointed superintendent of sewers; city recorder was ordered to pay \$20 for April and on the first of each month hereafter for 10 months pay \$10 to the Fortnightly Club for its library as per special city tax levy; the finance committee presented a report on the road and bridge tax of the city; Councilman Green was authorized to make a contract with Walters & Son, of Elmira, for 80,000 feet of sidewalk lumber at \$9 per 1000 feet delivered; Dunn Bros were granted the privilege to erect an electric sign in front of Mrs. Holden's building on Willamette street.

THE PASSOVER.

Jewish People Celebrate the Event for Eight Days.

Yesterday evening began the Jewish holiday season of the Passover, which lasts eight days. This festival is ordained in memory of the deliverance of Israel from bondage in the land of Egypt (2495 Jewish era, 1286 B. C.) the orthodox Jews heeding "Seven days shall ye eat unleavened bread; even the first day ye shall put away leaven out of your houses." (Exodus xii:15). All kinds of leaven is excluded from the houses of all Jews during the period of this festival; no bread is eaten, unleavened cakes called "matzoe" taking its place.
