TAKE HOME TALENT.

There are as bright and capable young and middle-aged educators in Oregon and on the Pacific Coast as at the East. A new president for the University of Oregon must soon be selected. Don't go east for the man! Take him from among the people he understands and who will understand him. Oregon educational institutions have too often met disaster through eastern importations. We should be through with them.

PORTLAND OREGONIAN AND STATE UNIVERSITY.

The Oregonian takes the opportunity of resignation of Dr Strong to accept a much more lucrative and influential position to again show its prejudice against the University of Oregon. The Portland paper should not be discouraged because the Eugene institution is not equal to those of "Ann Arbor, Madison, Lincoln and Lawrence." We may call the attention of the prejudiced critic in the Oregonian office to the fact that Oregon is a small state compared with Wisconsin, Michigan, Nebraska or Kansas; that the Oregonian is not a great paper compared with the Detroit Free Press, the Omaha Bee or World-Herald, or the Milwaukee Journal. Still we find no complaint that the Oregonian fails to fill the field in which it circulates.

The Oregonian could do much towards the upbuilding of the Oregon State University. It finds more agreeable employment, though, in occasional criticism almost without exception of a disparaging nature. It is unfortunate that the leading paper of the state should treat its state university so unkindly and unfairly. The University deserves better at its hands.

GEORGE CHAMBERLAIN, HIS CHARACTER AND CONSCIENCE.

There is this to say about Mr

Chamberlain, he is not receiving fair treatment at the hands of the Oregonian. It is true that he is "a good fellow," if a proper definition of that term be given. He is a generous, kindly man to meet whom is a great pleasure. He is genial and courteous, a man that wins friends everywhere he goes. He is generous towards his opponents.

But there is another side to his character, and that is his conscientious devotion to duty. He is the ideal official. He quickly says "yes" to a personal request of a friend or one who is in trouble, if that request touches not the duties of his official position, and he has a "no" that rings clear and strong upon every occasion when "no" is suggested by consideration of the good of the people whom he serves.

One can not come in personal contact with Mr Chamberlain without entertaining such convictions as are here set forth. Mr Chamberlain is, let it be said, the ideal official, and in a city more or less reeking with corruption, where men in all stations of life engage in or consent to grafting, the man is not in Portland who dares to say that Mr Chamberlain ever received any money from any corrupt source. I quote the words of a prominent republican, "who, by reason of his position, is compelled to work against Mr Chamberlain openly, but who will vote for him in private, and who says: 'I shall vote for Mr Chamberlain. He is one man in public office, who does not steal. He is one man who, having immense power and abundant opportunity to graft, has never grafted. He is one man who stands like steel against all offers or attempts to corrupt his honesty of purpose. His record is absolutely clean. I shall vote for George Chamberlain and he will be elected.'"

SCIENTIFIC OPTICS.

The Gibson Murder.

The Ashland Evening has this about the trial of T J Gibson, a former Lane county boy, and a son of Lewis Gibson who resides west of Eugene on Coyote creek, where the young man who is charged with murder was born:

"The trial of T J Gibson for the killing of Ben Schonbachler near Merlin is set for the circuit court for Josephine county in Grants Pass next Monday. The coroner's inquest investigated the case after which District Attorney Reames heard the testimony and arraigned Gibson for murder in the first degree on Tuesday. The defendant yesterday pleaded not guilty and a trial set for next Monday. G R Smith is the defendant's attorney.

"The shooting was over a hot quarrel growing out of four feet of disputed ground in a live fence, and last Thursday both men were in Grants Pass trying to have the other bound over to keep the peace, each having threatened the other. Friday as Gibson, who is about 25 years old, was coming into sight of Schonbachler from a hill he saw the latter with a gun in hand and asked him to drop it. Schonbachler did not do so and Gibson shot the top of his head off with a rifle, the second ball landing in the breast. The distance was testified to as 125 and 100 feet respectively."

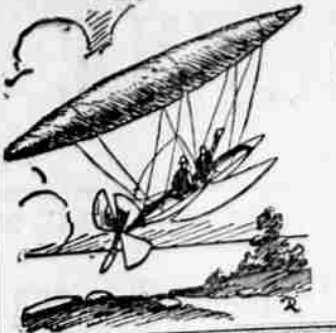
