WATER POWER.

Work Has Begun on Improvements to Mill Race.

WILL INCREASE 100-HORSE POWER.
Stigley & Chambers, owners of the Eugene water power, one of the largest and best in the state, have begun the work of making extensive improvements in the same, and when completed the capacity will have been increased 100-horse power, according to present calculations.
A force of men was at work Saturday and Sunday at the head of the mill race doing preliminary work, and next Sunday the work of deepening the race will begin. A large force of men will be put on, and the work will be done with scrapers operated by steam.

OMAHA, April 25.—A heavy wind storm swept over Missouri, Nebraska, Kansas, Iowa and Illinois today, causing great property loss.

JOPLIN, Mo., April 25.—Joplin was visited by the most destructive storm in its history, during which two persons were killed outright and six fatally injured, a score or more seriously hurt and \$800,000 worth of property destroyed. It is estimated that the buildings were destroyed. The wind was a straight gale, but it was of great velocity, whipping down some of the houses.
