DR SHELDON'S ADDRESS.

He Spoke on "Reconstruction of American Education."

Dr H D Sheldon, professor of Philosophy and Education, addressed the students of the University this morning at assembly. His subject was, "Reconstruction of American Education." Dr Sheldon explained the new system recently being introduced into the United States, but having been in vogue in England and Germany for several years. Under the present system the American youth must spend twenty years or more in school in order to come out a well-rounded educated man, fitted to meet the world in his calling whether it be law, medicine or theology. This time is divided as follows: Eight years in primary and grammar grades; four in high school; four years in college; and four years in professional school. Under the new system a student would be ready to enter life at twenty-three or four and at the same time get essentially all that was needed to make him a well-educated and well-prepared man. This object is accomplished in the new system by having the students get his linguistic, mathematical and other training in a longer high school course, and thereby cutting out its collegiate, and leaving his later university training thoroughly elective, giving an opportunity for earlier graduation. Dr Sheldon also spoke of Prof Ladd's views opposing the new system. He also referred to Prof Munsterberg's recent book the arguments of which he thinks are thoroughly met by other Germans in the recent numbers of "The Nation." Dr Strong was present and announced that he would have something to tell the students next Wednesday.
