ROME, April 30.—The officers of the United States cruiser Chicago, who were arrested at Venice, remain in prison there. An application for their discharge has been rejected. The Italian law does not allow the court to grant pardon in cases of assault on the police, as in the case of the American officers. It is considered probable, however, that the prisoners will be released by order of the King, June 1, the date of the fete of the constitution.

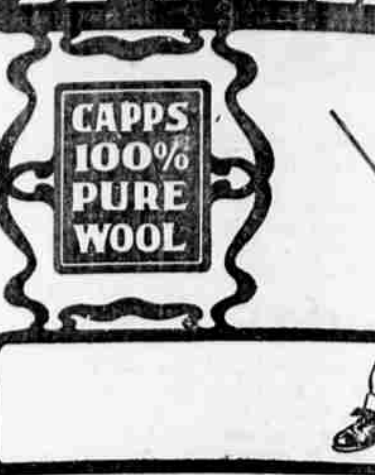

A Supreme Court Decision

J. C. Goodale, respondent, vs. Wheeler, et al, appellants, against Lane county. J. W. Hamilton, affirmed. Opinion of Justice Watson.

This was a creditors' suit June 12, 1899, to have A. Wheeler cleared to be the owner of lot 1 blk 6, Fairmount. Late mortgage set aside certain conveyances of lots, and subject them to payment of plaintiff's demand.

The court finds the deed a semblance of fraud in its execution regarding the conveyance of property. The sons, by whom father transferred the property to wife, are held parties to the fraud, the court holds they cannot be considered innocent purchasers.

In concluding, the opinion says: any the least, the transaction extended all the way along with an atmosphere of distrust, and among near relatives, the debtors were called upon to explain and flush the exercise of entire good faith overcome the prima facie case and the proof favorable to the plaintiff cause, and this they have not done. The principles here involved are of such importance that the court, and it is so ordered.
