BOHEMIA RAILROAD.

Construction Gang Camp Pitched Near Mosby Bridge.

A Cottage Grove dispatch of Monday, May 5, says the Pacific Coast Construction Co., represented by Alexander & Campbell, of the Pacific Timber Co., were that day unloading a construction outfit, consisting of four cars and pitching camp half a mile below the Mosby bridge, where immediate work on the grade will commence, grading gangs working both ways. The bridge gang is already at work under the direct supervision of T. K. Campbell, and the right-of-way clearing gang now has three miles cleared. The contract calls for 22 miles of completed road, the first 10 miles to be completed and ready for rolling stock by July 31. One thousand tons of rails are now on the way and will arrive this week.

Cottage Grove is crowded with strangers, and in ten days from now, if the present weather continues, the road from here to Bohemia will be strung with freight teams carrying to the mines equipment for the greatest season's work in the history of the diggings.
